### A Narrow Escape.

An accident was barely averted Monday night on the Pennsylvania railroad, on the high trestle bridge, above Dark Water, says the Mahanoy City Record. As the train, which leaves Pottsville at 8:05, pulled out which leaves Pottsville at 8:00, puried out from Dark Water, the engineer noticed a dickering light of warning on the track ahead. It was a miner, on his way from work, who, having no lantern with which to give the signal had struck a match, and succeeded by its feeble blaze in attracting the cagle eye of the engineer. The train was brought to a standstill, and the miner boarded the engine, with the story on his lips that a stray horse, which had been grazing in a near field, had walked along the trestle from the east side to near the centre trestle from the east side to near the centre of the bridge, where the animal missed its footing and fell, with its forelegs on the outer side of the rail, and its body daughing between the trucks. An investigation proved the story to be true. Had the train struck the animal it would have plunged over the bridge with its load of human freight, down one hundred feet to the tracks below. A chain was placed around the body of the animal, the end of which was attached to the locomotive, and in this manner the horse was dragged to solid ground. The train then passed over the bridge in safety, being delayed one hour. It was a narrow escape.
