Removed to the Children's Home.

Four children were removed from the almshouse
to the Children's Home, at Pottsville,
yesterday morning. Three of the children
belong to Joseph Crandall, of Shenandoah,
and a boy of Charles Zellner, of Minersville.
Under the law the Home receives
\$1.75 per week from the county funds for the
maintenance of the children.

A Distressing Accident.

A distressing accident occurred at the
Eagle Hill colliery, near St. Clair, yesterday,
by which John Harrison, aged 17 years, lost
his life. The cage, containing couplets and
some other material, toppled over when near
the foot of the slope and striking young
Harrison, a driver boy, instantly killed him.
The unfortunate lad's brains were dashed out,
and his body was cut in two by the heavy
material that fell from the cage. This was
but the second day for him to work. He
was the son of Peter Harrison, of St. Clair.

ACCIDENT AT LOST CREEK.

**Two Men Badly Burned by an Explosion
This Afternoon.**

An accident occurred at Packer No. 2
colliery this afternoon by which two men
were badly burned, and one of them will
probably lose his sight.
John Dunlavy, of Lost Creek, and James
Wasser, of town, are employed at the above
colliery as miners, and this afternoon, at about
one o'clock, they prepared a shot, and
immediately after it was fired an explosion
occurred. Dunlavy was badly injured about
the face, and it is thought he will lose his eye-
sight. He was removed to the Miners' hospi-
tal. He is a married man with a large
family. Wasser was not so badly injured,
and is now at his home in Shenandoah.

late Morgan L. Williams, died at the home
of her son in Pottsville yesterday, aged 85
years. The family formerly resided at
Minersville, where interment will be made
tomorrow afternoon. Mr. Williams was a
prominent coal operator and well known
throughout the county.

The funeral of Blanche, the six-month-old
daughter of Harry and Annie Kelly, of 238
South Jardin street, took place to-day, the
remains being interred at Centralia.

Harmuth Frythall, the 2-year-old daughter
of William Frythall, of Wm. Penn, suc-
cumbed to the heat on Monday last and was
interred in the Odd Fellows' cemetery
yesterday.

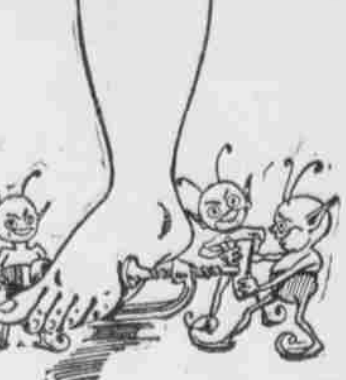
