TRAGEDY AT A RACE.

Sad End of a Contest Between Well Known Yachts.

BARON VON ZEDTOWITZ KILLED.

Emperor William's Meteor Crashed Into the Isolda, Tore Out Her Mast and Swept Everybody from the Deck, Including Her Owner.

SOUTHSEA, England, Aug. 19.—An accident resulting in the dismantling of Baron von Zedwitz's American built yacht Isolda and the death of her proprietor, occurred yesterday during the regatta of the Royal Albert Yacht club.

Mr. A. Barclay Walker of Alton, the Prince of Wales' Britannia, Mr. A. D. Clarke's Satanita and Emperor William's Meteor started in the order given in the race for the vice commodore's cup and £25. An hour later the smaller yachts in contest for prizes were sent away over the same course. Mr. Frank Jameson's The Saint, Mr. Howard Gould's Niagara, Mr. Ogden Goslee's Samphire, Lord Darnley's Andrey, Mr. Charles Day Rose's Pontent and Baron von Zedwitz's Isolda were the contestants.

While the big yachts were passing the committee boat they overtook the twenty rater, Britannia and Meteor were almost abreast of Isolda, the two first mentioned yachts narrowly coming into collision. Then Britannia suddenly shifted her helm in order to avoid The Saint, and Meteor, not having room enough, fouled Isolda almost bows on, and swept her from stem to stern with her bowsprit. In a moment Isolda was a complete wreck. The mast, with its clouds of white sail, collapsed as if struck by lightning, and every member of her crew and the passengers on deck, the latter including Baron von Zedwitz and his brother, were swept overboard and more or less seriously injured.

All were rescued, but the baron was taken from the water with a bad cut on his head and bleeding from the ears. He was conveyed on board the nearest yacht, which promptly headed for Ryde, where the nearest hospital was located, but the baron died before reaching shore. All races of the day were abandoned, and the regatta scheduled for today has been indefinitely postponed, and all the flags are at half mast.

The baron, who was not 40 years old, was considered one of the leading men of the younger generation of German statesmen. He was a privy councillor, a member of both the Reichstag and the Prussian diet, and was leader of the Free Conservative party. He leaves a wife and an infant child.

Killed in Self Defense.
CINCINNATI, Aug. 19.—Fred S. Rothacker, who was stabbed by Charles Lundy, an attorney, on Mount Auburn street, early on Monday morning, died yesterday at the hospital from the effect of the wound. The charge against Lundy will be changed to murder, but it is likely that a case of self defense will be shown. Lundy is an athlete, but it appears that he was not well, and was in no condition to meet even a single antagonist with natural weapons when attacked by the Rothackers.

A Young Woman's Suspicious Death.
PITTSBURGH, Aug. 19.—Word was brought to police headquarters that a young woman had died under suspicious circumstances at a house on Third avenue. Detectives investigated the case and arrested Dr. S. P. Anderson, of Allegheny, and Miss Anna Schreengost, of Manassas, Va. Miss Schreengost confessed that the dead girl was her cousin, Dakota Schreengost, and that she had engaged Dr. Anderson to produce an abortion. The doctor says he will prove his innocence.

Serious Charge Against the Sultan.
LONDON, Aug. 19.—The Daily News says it is stated that further diplomatic correspondence will be issued shortly, showing that the Armenian outrages had their origin in the Yildiz kiosk, the residence of the sultan, and that they were approved of by his majesty for the purpose of warning the Turkish reform party what to expect unless its members desisted from their propaganda. The paper declares that the correspondence will also show that 100,000 Armenians were massacred.

Italy's Crown Prince Betrothed.
LONDON, Aug. 19.—A news agency dispatch here makes the announcement as an absolute fact that the Prince of Naples, crown prince of Italy, has been betrothed to Princess Helene, third daughter of the Prince of Montenegro. The Prince of Naples is in his 37th year and Princess Helene is 23. It was announced in February last with equal positiveness that Princess Helene had been betrothed to King Alexander of Servia.

The Express Strike in New York.
NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—At the offices of the Adams Express company in this city it was said today that the strike inaugurated Monday morning is practically at an end. More than the usual number of expressmen it was said, are out today, and business is being done with the usual expedition. The strikers, however, profess to believe that they will yet carry their point.

Governor Matthews Seriously Ill.
INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 19.—During Governor Matthews' address at Brookville on Saturday a rain storm broke before he finished, but the crowd insisted that he continue his speech until the close. The governor felt the exposure, and on Monday he was prostrated by a congestive chill, which is still confining him to his room.

More Spanish Troops for Cuba.
MADRID, Aug. 19.—The first embarkation of 14,000 troops for Cuba will commence at Santander on Aug. 23, terminating on Aug. 30. The second will take place from Aug. 30 till Sept. 6, after which the whole expedition of 40,000 will have left the peninsula.

Chauncey M. Depew Will Preside.
NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—It is announced that Chauncey M. Depew will preside at the mass meeting at Carnegie Hall on the night of Aug. 27, at which the campaign here is to be opened by ex-President Harrison. Senator Thurston, of Nebraska, has been invited to address the meeting, but has not yet accepted.

DELAWARE DEMOCRATS

They Nominates Tunnell for Governor and Indulge Bryan and Sewall.
DOVER, Aug. 19.—The Democratic state convention, in session here yesterday, nominated the following ticket: For governor, Elie W. Tunnell of Sussex; congress, La. Irving Handy of New Castle; electors, John H. Rodney of New Castle, John Harrington of Kent and Paymer Frame of Sussex.

The result of the gubernatorial fight has left a bitter feeling, the friends of Peter J. Ford of Wilmington, who was defeated by Tunnell, openly avowing that they will not support the ticket. The convention was the most turbulent ever held in Dover, and on several occasions it was impossible to continue.

Ex-Governor Robert J. Reynolds acted as chairman, and a vice president and secretary from each county was named. The platform "denounces the prevalent dishonesty of the electoral of the state by the corrupting hands of ambition and wealth, and appeals to a healthy public opinion to support a vigorous execution of the laws against bribery and corruption at the polls. It pledges the electors to the support of the candidates, William J. Bryan and Arthur J. Sewall, nominated for president and vice president by the national Democratic convention, held in Chicago on the 7th of July last," and extols the high character and citizenship of the candidates.

Rebellious Yaqui Indians Captured.
TUCSON, A. T., Aug. 19.—A courier who has just arrived here from Oliver camp states that Troop E, Seventh cavalry, Lieutenant Bullock commanding, had a fight with Yaqui Indians ten miles south of here. The Indians were entrenched behind rocks on the top of the mountain. The fight lasted for three hours. The troops charged them in their stronghold, killing three and capturing the entire band of thirty, among whom were three squaws. Three soldiers were wounded, one mortally. The Yaquis were armed with Winchesters, pistols and knives, and were better armed than the military. They will be turned over to the civil authorities.

Political Arrests in Spain.
MADRID, Aug. 19.—Many Republican ex-ministers and members of the chamber of deputies have been arrested in Barcelona on the charge of conducting a revolutionary agitation and the discovery of an alleged plot to prevent the departure of reinforcements for Cuba. Senor Estanbana, minister of war under the Spanish republic in 1870, has been placed under arrest in Barcelona because of political complications in Spain.

Paris Conflagration Charged to Anarchists.
PARIS, Aug. 19.—A great Montpelier industrial exhibition destroyed the most valuable pictures and some of the most important papers in the archives. Montpelier university was also burned, the damage being estimated at \$100,000. There are rumors that the fire was incendiary, and anarchists are supposed to have started the conflagration.

Speaker Mould for Congress.
BALTIMORE, Aug. 19.—The Republican convention in the Sixth congressional district has named Sidney E. Mould, speaker of the Maryland lower house, as the candidate for congress in the coming campaign.
