FRAM'S SAFE RETURN.

Nansen's Arctic Steamer Now at Tromsø, Norway.
CAPTAIN SVERDRUP MET ANDREE.

The Aeronaut Explorer Has Abandoned His Idea of Starting for the North Pole This Season, but Now Intends to Start in April Next.

CHRISTIANIA, Norway, Aug. 21.—Dr. Nansen's Arctic exploring steamer Fram has arrived safely at Skjerve, a fishing port on the bay near the North Cape. A dispatch from Skjerve to The Aftenposten says that on Aug. 14 the Fram called at Danos Island, where a visit was made to M. Andree, the Swedish explorer, whose intention it is to attempt to find the North Pole by means of a balloon. M. Andree had not yet made his ascension. The Fram sailed from Skjerve for Tromsø yesterday. All on board were well.

Shortly after receiving the news of the arrival of the Fram at Skjerve, and her intention to sail from that place at once for Tromsø, Dr. Nansen started for the latter place to meet her. Before leaving the harbor Nansen wired Captain Sverdrup, the commander of the Fram, as follows: "A thousand welcomes to you all. Hurrah for the Fram."

King Oscar has wired Captain Otto Neumann Sverdrup expressing sentiments of the warmest welcome and congratulating him on the honor won for Norway. There is great enthusiasm throughout the town, bunting being everywhere displayed, the decorations in the harbor being especially fine.

A dispatch to The Aftenposten from Skjerve says that the Fram reached open water Aug. 12. A member of the expedition expresses the opinion that the Fram would have penetrated much further into the Arctic regions, and that perhaps the North Pole would have been reached if the Fram had been frozen in east of the New Siberian Islands. In the highest latitude reached, 86.15 north, members of the exploring parties saw millmoths, fulmars, and narwhals, but no other signs of organic life were apparent.

Professor S. A. Andree, according to reports received here, told Captain Sverdrup, who visited the aeronaut, that it was now too late to make the proposed ascent, and that he would probably soon return to Spitzbergen, but make another effort to reach the North Pole in a balloon next April.

The Fram, it is said, still has provisions capable of sustaining her crew in the Arctic regions for three years. Fearing that the crush of the ice would wreck the ship, Captain Sverdrup and the crew were obliged, after Dr. Nansen left, to remove all the sledges, provisions, ammunition and light furniture.

Additional details received regarding the Fram are to the effect that the boat drifted from a point 85.59 degrees north. The greatest sea depth obtained by sounding was 2,185 fathoms. The lowest temperature noted was 32 degrees below zero.

F. H. Johnson, the stoker, it is reported, had a narrow escape from a terrible death. He was attacked by a polar bear, but was rescued by Dr. Nansen, who shot the animal.

The Fram Arrives at Tromsø.
TROMSØ, Norway, Aug. 21.—The Fram arrived here this morning. The entire town has been decorated in honor of the event and considerable enthusiasm is manifested.

Terrible Tragedy in West Virginia.

HINTON, W. Va., Aug. 21.—News has reached this city of a terrible tragedy near Cashmere, Monroe county. Louis Crotty and James Polley had been enemies for some time, and on Tuesday they went to a wheat threshing and the trouble was renewed. Crotty knocked Polley down and then pulling a revolver shot him twice, one ball going through his heart. Polley grabbed the revolver and was about to succeed in taking it away from Crotty when Crotty's son ran behind Polley and struck him across the neck with a pitchfork, breaking his neck and killing him instantly. Young Crotty was arrested and lodged in jail.

Organized Against Thieves.

CLARKSVILLE, Ark., Aug. 21.—Johnston county farmers in the vicinity of Lamar have begun whitecap operations in an effort to rid the community of cotton thieves. For the past two or three years farmers in that neighborhood have been annoyed by wholesale petty thieves. Cotton, cattle and hogs have been stolen. An armed band of twenty-five farmers called on several families suspected of the thefts and notified them to leave the community. Instead of leaving the alleged thieves are arming themselves with shotguns, and trouble is expected to occur.

Yacht Captized, Young Woman Drowned.

CAMDEN, N. J., Aug. 21.—A dispatch was received here yesterday stating that the yacht Bertha, which left here last Tuesday with a party of nine, had capsized off Fortescue, in the lower bay, and that Marie Harper, aged 19, had been drowned. The party were homeward bound, when a sudden squall struck the yacht and capsized it. Fishermen on the beach at Fortescue put off and rescued all but Miss Harper, who was caught in the companionway when the yacht went over.

Robbed of His Gold Bricks.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 21.—George McCauley, one of the prominent wealthy mining men of this city, and part owner of the Cariboo gold mine at Trull, B. C., was held up by a masked lone highwayman in the mountains, a few miles from the mines, and at the point of a rifle was compelled to hand over \$1,400 in gold bricks, the last month's output of the Cariboo, which he was bringing to this city.

Used Dynamite as a Weapon.

TOLEDO, Aug. 21.—Because he did not receive what he deemed adequate compensation for rights of way on his property, James Hunsinger of Perryburg attempted to drive off an electric railroad construction gang with dynamite. The explosive went off in Hunsinger's hand, and maimed him so that he will die. E. N. Pratt, foreman of construction, was frightfully injured, but will probably survive.

A NEW MEXICO DELUGE

Cloudburst Suddenly Sweeps the Town of Mogollon.

A HUNDRED FAMILIES HOMELESS.

One Man Drowned in His Cabin and Another Swept Away to His Death—Narrow Escape of Mine Assayers—An Eight Foot Wall of Water.

MOGOLLON, N. M., Aug. 21.—A terrible cloudburst struck this place on Wednesday, leaving death and destruction behind. John Knight, a miner who resided at Georgetown, was drowned in his cabin. Several others are reported missing, but so far only two bodies, those of Knight and an unknown Mexican, have been recovered. These were found in a field about six miles below. About a hundred families have been rendered homeless and thirty houses washed away.

Property of the Colonial Mining company, of Boston, Mass., has suffered to a large extent, the assay office, millhouse, powder house and blacksmith shop being washed away. It is feared that the mine is filled with mud and water. The managers and assayers had a narrow escape, being assisted to the bank by means of ropes.

The Deep Down Mining company, of Kansas City, lost their main office and assay office. The place is situated in a deep canyon, between high mountains. The flood attained a height of over eight feet in the street, and lasted over thirty minutes. Had it so continued ten minutes longer the whole town would have been swept away.

It is feared that great damage is done on the other side of the Mogollon district. Nothing definite can be learned on account of telephone communication being broken. It is feared that the loss of life around Mogollon will be much greater than first reports make it. There were at least twenty persons, mostly miners, lying right in the track of the great wall of water. The loss to the mining companies will be thousands of dollars.

The Alleged Insult to Spain's Flag.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Up to this time state department officials say they have not heard officially of any firing upon the flag of Spain by the people of Key West, Fla., reference to which was made in the chamber of deputies at Madrid. The proposition is that whoever has been doing toward learning the facts in the case has been undertaken by the Spanish minister to the United States, and that if the attention of his government is called to the alleged outrage it will be through the medium of Mr. De Lome.

Fire Panic at an Infirmary.

VAN WERT, O., Aug. 21.—Fire destroyed the Van Wert county infirmary early in the morning. Thirty inmates barely escaped with their lives, and in their night clothes. Two were badly burned, an old woman had both arms broken, and half a dozen suffered slight injuries. Most of the patients had to be dragged from their beds and forcibly carried out of doors. They are being cared for in rude shanties, hastily nailed together. There was a panic among the inmates, most of whom are cripples.

Bold Train Robbers in Indiana.

LEBANON, Ind., Aug. 21.—As the east-bound passenger train on the Big Four was leaving the station three masked men were seen to jump from the platform of the front coach and disappear among several cars on the side track. A passenger in the front of the coach had been held up at the point of a revolver and forced to surrender \$75 and a gold watch. The men had been concealed in the toilet room. The passengers were so terrified that the bandits made good their escape.
