Many Persons Injured on the Pittsburg and Western Division.

PASSENGER COACHES OVERTURNED

The Accident Con .- red at Valencia Station, Twenty-iw, Miles from Pittsburg, and Was Caused by the Airbrakes Refusing to Work.

Pitrantiae, Aug 25.—The through Chi-cago mail train, No. 11, on the Pitraburg and Western railread, which is due in Al-leghony in the afternson. was wrecked at Valoncia Station, twenty-two miles from this city. First reports were to the effect that fifteen persons had been killed. The latest information is that no one was killed outright. The engineer, who was on the lookout for No. 25, put on the airbrakes, but they refused to work, and his train crashed into the local. Just at the time the two freights collided the passengor came along on the eastbound track and was struck by the freight cars, which were derailed at that moment. The engine and baggage car of the passenger train got through safely and broke away from the balance of the train. The first passenger coach, in which were a great many ladles, was crushed by a carload of oil well tubing. The tubing was thrown with terrific force in every direction, causing most of the wounds received by the passengers. The wreckage was piled twen-

ty-five or thirry feet high in places.
The railroad people say the whole trou-ble was caused by the failure of the airmakes to work while the through freight vas on the hill.
