BRYAN AT BUFFALO.

He is Greeted Enthusiastically by Residents of the Bison City.
BUFFALO, Aug. 28.—Upon their arrival in the city from Erie at 3.30, Mr. and Mrs. Bryan were escorted to the Genesee hotel. There they were quartered in apartments which had been occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Cleveland just before the election of the president, and upon the walls of which hung portraits of the president and his wife. A reception was held for two hours at the hotel.

Mr. Bryan was escorted to the hall by the Cleveland Democracy, the city's oldest party organization, and by ward clubs bearing torches. The line of march was along half a mile of Main street, crowded almost as thickly as was the hall, and red froward cannon announced the candidate's coming. In the hall the crowd aroused itself listening to an eloquent gentleman in the gallery, who loudly read an original poem having the refrain: "Bill Bryan, dear Bryan, stand first in the fight."

When the candidate appeared upon the stage, escorted by State Commissioner John C. Cannon, the police were powerless to control the audience and swarming down to the front several hundred men took possession of the seats reserved for the elite which escorted Mr. Bryan.

New Jersey Republicans.

THENTON, Aug. 28.—The Republican state convention to nominate presidential electors was called to order at 12 o'clock yesterday by Franklin Murphy, chairman of the Republican state committee. United States Senators Sewall Compton Gardner, Pitney and Parker, and nearly all of the Republican leaders in the state were present, with the exception of Garrett A. Hobart, the vice presidential nominee. Governor Griggs addressed the meeting. The following electors were chosen: Delegates-at-large: J. E. Dryden, Essex; Samuel H. Gray, Camden; First district, Thomas W. Truchard, Cumberland; Second district, Colonel Washington A. Boehling, Mercer; Third district, Adolph Mack, Somerset; Fourth district, A. R. Whitney, Morris; Fifth district, J. Hall Browning, Bergen; Sixth district, James T. Hall, Essex; Seventh district, George F. Perkins, Hudson; Eighth district, Ernest Ackermann, Union.

Arrival of Li Hung Chang.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The United States dispatch boat Dolphin took General Huger and staff, the Chinese representatives and all other invited persons down the bay to meet the American liner steamer St. Louis early this morning. As soon as the custom house officers boarded the incoming steamer the Dolphin steamed up alongside and the party got aboard and met Li Hung Chang. The honored guest remained on board the St. Louis until the vessel reached the Fulton street dock. The party then entered carriages, and headed by the Sixth cavalry, under command of Colonel Sumner, and the cavalry band, proceeded down West street to Battery park, thence up Broadway to Fourth street, to Washington square, and thence to the Hotel Waldorf.

Admiral Meade Home.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Admiral Richard W. Meade, late of United States navy, arrived today from Europe, and left at once by special train for St. Paul to attend the national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic. The admiral will be welcomed at the encampment by the national association of naval veterans, who are enthusiastically urging his election as commander-in-chief of the Grand Army, to succeed Major Walker, of Indiana. Admiral Meade, as commander of Lafayette Post of New York City, represents one of the strongest departments east of the Alleghenies. He is a hero of the quarter-deck with forty-five years of continuous service under the flag of the republic to his credit. From 1871 to 1895 he served in the squadrons of the North and South Atlantic, the upper Mississippi and the West Gulf. Immediately upon his retirement from the navy last year he joined the ranks of the Grand Army, uniting with Lafayette post. The naval element of the Grand Army has never yet been honored by the selection of a commander-in-chief from its ranks.

Fire in a Michigan Town.

SAULT STE MARIE, Mich., Aug. 28.—This city yesterday experienced the worst fire since Aug. 9, 1893, when the whole business portion of the town was almost entirely destroyed. Today's fire started in North Water street, and before it could be gotten under subjection over \$300,000 worth of property was destroyed. Among the burned buildings are the 800 National Bank block, the Pranzelauer block, Chipewa House, Cleveland House, Metzger block, Boney hotel, postoffice and United States customs office, telephone exchange and a number of wooden structures. The loss is about half covered by insurances.

MORE RIOTING IN BRAZIL

Fighting Between a Group of Jacobins and Italians.

TROOPS HAD TO BE CALLED OUT.

The Italian Government Sends Word to Its Legation to Demand Full Satisfaction for the Various Attacks—Italian Consul Insulted.

RENO, Aug. 28.—A severe engagement occurred at the San Paulo railroad station between a body of Brazilians of the Jacobin faction and a group of Italians. Many were wounded. Attacks and insults against Italians continue in Rio Janeiro.

The Italian government has sent word to its legation at Rio Janeiro demanding full satisfaction for the outrages upon Italian residents for the order the legation home at once unless the demand is met.

It is charged that the police are showing little energy in punishing the authors of the trouble. In Tridentes square on Tuesday night a group of Jacobins tried to attack the house of an Italian. The police were powerless, and called upon the troops to act. In the charge which was made six were wounded. Many students were in the Brazilian attacking party.

The trouble is now spreading to Pernambuco. Attacks have been made and the Italian consul there was insulted.

The Italian legation has received orders to support Consul Bricchietani. The legation, it is also said, has received instruction from Rome to inform the Brazilian minister of foreign affairs, Saverio Cavallotti, that the quibbling regarding the situation is one of extreme gravity.
