REBURING THE SULTAN.

The Embassies Decline to Honor a Royal Anniversary.

TURKS ORGANIZED MASSACRES.

The Saltan Has Again Approached Dangerously Near the Point of Forcing His Own Dethronement - British Marines Disperse a Murderous Turkish Mola

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sopt. 1.—The embers sies were not illuminated resterday, the anniversary of the sultan's accession to the throne, owing to the recent massicres. The dragomen of the embassies, while they went to the Yildis klock to convey the good wishes of the ambassadors, were instructed to leave notes, which, although they congratulate the sultan upon the anniversary of his accession to the throne, expressed deep regret at the recent out-

There is no longer any doubt that the massiones were organized by the Turkish authorines, and it has been ascertained that orders were only given to the bashi-baroults to cease massacring the Armenlans after the bloody work had been go-ing on for thirty hours. It is also a fact that hundreds of Turks were brought over from the Asiatic side of the B sphorus in order to take part in the massacres, and many Armenians were put into boats, which were then taken out to sea. Their fate is unknown, but there is not the slightest doubt but that they have been
