THE TOWN'S DISGRACE. Never in the history of the borough have the people of Shenandoah experienced such intense and bitter feelings, bordering on desperation, as was manifested yesterday when it became known that Superintendent Bogart had been arrested by "Jack" Tool, upon a warrant sworn to by "Jim" Smith.

Mr. Bogart has always courted a thorough investigation. In fact, he has expressed himself as only too willing to meet his accusers in a court of justice. Those who believe that the gentleman is a victim of persecution originated at Knoxville, are just as firm in their demand for a judicial determination of the case to-day as they were when the election and subsequent execution on the part of the School Board took place.

For this reason it was expected that the minority members of the School Board, instead of a man of no standing or responsibility, would prove their assertions by a criminal presentation and give to that proceeding at least some respectability. The minutes of the whole affair is shown by the brutal treatment to which Mr. Bogart was subjected, and it is a disgrace to the town.

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CZAR LEAVES GERMANY.

The Monarchs Visibly Affected as They Separated at Corlitz. CORLITZ, Prussian Silesia, Sept. 8.—Upon the arrival here of their majesties, the emperor and empress of Russia and the emperor and empress of Germany, yesterday they were received in state by the provincial, municipal and military authorities assembled on the platform of the railroad station. The burgomaster delivered an address of welcome, to which Emperor William replied, expressing the thanks of Emperor Nicholas, as well as his own. Their majesties drove together to the review ground, followed by the empresses in a second carriage.

The streets were profusely decorated with Russian and German flags, etc., and packed with crowds of people, the various veteran association, societies, etc., and nearly all the school children of the town and its vicinity in picturesque groups and attire in their brightest holiday clothing. The imperial party was heartily cheered on all sides.

The departure of the czar and zarina was marked by an enthusiastic popular ovation. All of the German princes and the court officials awaited their majesties at the station. The route of the march was lined with masses of troops, and behind the troops stood the dense masses of the people, who cheered vociferously as the two rulers passed. On the platform at the station the czar and zarina bade adieu to the German princes and to the other distinguished persons gathered there, and then, in the most cordial manner, they made their farewells to the emperor and empress of Germany. The two empresses embraced warmly, both being visibly moved, as were also the two emperors. The czar and zarina then entered the train, the band again playing the Russian anthem. The Russian imperial pair waved adieu from the train until it was out of sight.

LI HUNG CHANG AT TORONTO. TORONTO, Sept. 8.—The special train with Li Hung Chang and suite on board arrived in the city yesterday afternoon on time. The train was stopped opposite the exhibition grounds and the statesman was met by parliamentary and civic notables and escorted through the grounds to the platform in front of the grand stand, where an address of welcome was read to him by Lieutenant Governor Kirkpatrick, of Ontario, to which Li Hung Chang, through his interpreter, briefly responded. He was cheered by the large crowd present and seemed pleased with the ovation. At 4 o'clock he boarded the train for North Bay, whence he will continue on his journey to the Pacific coast.

Senator Voorhees Seriously Ill. TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Sept. 8.—Senator Voorhees is ill and failing so rapidly that his friends fear he will be unable to take part in the campaign. The continued delay and doubt as to his purpose and physical ability to take part in the campaign are causing much private comment and conjecture in political circles. With the exception of a few intimate friends here no one has authentic information as to the present condition of his health, and nothing at all has been heard in a public way from him on the political issues of the campaign.

Secretary Herbert's Views. LONDON, Sept. 8.—The Daily News this morning publishes a column interview with Hon. Hilary A. Herbert, secretary of the navy of the United States. "No, doubt," said Mr. Herbert, "some of the cold Democrats will feel obliged to vote for the Bryan ticket, because Bryan carried the Chicago convention, but many will not do so. In my opinion the Bryan movement has reached its height and is now declining." Mr. Herbert said that his official position prevented him from speaking more freely.
