SILVER JUBILEE CONVENTION.
Delegates of the C. T. A. U. of Pa., Meet at Shamokin.
SHAMOKIN, Sept. 10.—The 25th annual state convention of the C. T. A. U. of Pa., inaugurated a session yesterday morning which will last for three days. Delegates are here from all over the state and each incoming train adds to the long list.

At 8 o'clock the delegates in a body attended a celebration of mass at St. Edward's church at which Rev. Father Cadori officiated. After singing the mass he addressed the representatives in a few well chosen words.

The afternoon was devoted to hearing reports of the condition of the various societies and transacting routine business. Last evening the delegates attended the performance of the "C. O. D." at the opera house, and to-night they will hold their twenty-fifth annual outing at Mayaville park.

The convention is largely attended, and will be productive of much good for the temperance cause in general.

Nothing that has occurred within the vicinity of Shenandoah since the Gilberton riots has aroused more excitement and been the subject of greater comment than the arrest at Shenandoah yesterday of School Superintendent Bogart. The chief official was taken in custody yesterday morning by John Toole county detective, and is being held in Allegheny county. * * * This is the first time in Allegheny county. * * * These anti-social people who are opposed to the incursions, but who are not, ostensibly for moral reasons, but selfishness, as it is alleged by his friends from long and wives; in short, as a last resort in an angry, bitterly waged battle to oust him from the position for Mr. Whitaker, the former Superintendent.

Can Carry News Letters.
Some time ago the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company was notified by the Postmaster General that the baggage-masters and other train hands would not be permitted to carry mail for the Lehigh Valley Coal Company or other concerns in unstamped envelopes. This order was interpreted to mean all news letters, that were formerly carried from correspondents in one town to newspapers published in another. From inquiry it has been learned that news letters will be carried as heretofore provided they are enclosed in stamped envelopes. Any envelope with a stamp stuck on it will not do. It must be an envelope with the stamp printed on it so that when the letter is opened the stamp is destroyed.
