DYNAMITE PLOT NIPPED.

Infernal Machines Captured by the Police of Rotterdam.

TYNAN AND BELL ARRAIGNED.

London, Sept. 15.—It is generally be-lieved here that the police, by the arrests of Edward Bell at Giasgow on Saturday, J. Wallace and John F. Koarney at Rot-terdam, and P. J. P. Tynan ("No. 1") at Bonlogne-sur-Mer. France, have nipped a widespread dynamits plot in the lud. At Patraday dynamics plot in the lud. At Botterdam, in addition to arresting Wai-lace and Kearney, the police captured a number of infernal machines and a quan-

number of infernal machines and a quantity of correspondence, which is said to incriminate a number of people.

A semi-official communication upon the subject of the arrests was issued yesterday afternoon. It says: "There has been, within the full knowledge of the Scotland Yard officials for some time past, a gang basile arranged in America in preserving busily engaged in America in preparing the ratifications for an extensive and disbolical plot to perpetuate a dynamite outrage in this country and establish a reign
of terror. Gradually and quietly a complete net work was drawn around the

Bell was arraigned at the central police

court yesterday and, after the usual for-malities had been goue through with, the prisoner was remanded until Wednesday next. The alleged dynamiter, who seemed cool and unconcerned, was handcuffed while in court and guarded by two specially detailed policemen. The prisoner has very little to say about his being taken into custody. The only information which he has thus far vouchsafed is that he is not

he has thus far vouchsafed is finite is not a British subject.

A dispatch from Boulogne-sur-Mer says that Tynan was arraigned there yesterday before the deputy police prosecutor. The proceedings were confined to furnishing evidence of the arrest and the establishment of the identity of the prisoner, which the latter fully advanted. Two Sectland the latter fully admitted. Two Scatland Yard detectives were present at these for-malities, and eventually the prisoner was remanded and taken to the town juli, while awaiting the arrival from London of the documents necessary to bring about

his extradition.
It appears that Tynan, during his continental tour, passed himself off as a queen's messenger, or royal courier, and said that Bell, who was traveling with sau that both who was traveling who him, was his secretary. Tynan asserted that they were on their way to Copen-hagen with an autograph letter from Queen Victoria to the ezar. During his stay at Boulogne. Tynan showed every evidence of being in possession of plenty of money and of having large funds to draw upon. He lived well, and his staple beverage was champagne. Dispatches received from Brussels say

that information obtained there from reliable sources indicates that the dynamiters whose laboratory was discovered at Ant-werp were not Fenians, but anarchists, whose aim was directed against the czar. and it is known that the police of Antwerp were informed by the Scotland Yard authorities that a plot was in preparation to try to assassinate the caar in London, hence the discovery of the dynamite bomb laboratory at Antwerp. Many bombs, it appears, had already been manufactured, and the police believe that one of the con-spirators, who is believed to have fled to Breslau, has taken several infernal machines with him.

Wreck of an Italian Bark on the Massachusetts Coast,

SUICIDE OF CAPTAIN AND MATE

Three Sailors Were Drowned and Seven Reach Shore in Safety-The Monte Tabor, from Trapant, Italy, Laden with Salt, a Complete Wreck.

HIGHLAND LIGHT, Mass. Sept. 15.—The Italian bark Monte Tabor, from Trapant for Hoston, with a cargo of salt, was wrecked on Peaked Hill bar at midnight A thick fog prevailed all night and al-though the crew of the Peaked Hill life saving station patrolled the leach constantly nothing was known of the disaster until some of the crew reached shore on pieces of the wreek. None of them could pletes of the wreck. None of them could speak or understand English; the informa-tion gleaned from them was very meager. Afterwards a chest came ashore, evidently the property of the captain. From documents found in it the name and destination of the vessel were learned. Later by signs the crew made, known the section of the consulting and

The surviv-ing members of the crew, numbering seven, are being cared for by the life
