DYNAMITE PLOT NIPPED.

Infernal Machines Captured by the Police of Rotterdam.

TYNAN AND BELL ARRAIGNED.

One of the Men Arrested is Believed to be a New Yorker Named J. F. Kearney. Tynan Passed Himself Off as a Queen's Courier.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—It is generally believed here that the police, by the arrests of Edward Bell, who grew on Saturday, J. Wallace and John P. Kearney at Rotterdam, and P. J. Tynan ("No. 1") at Boulogne-sur-Mer, France, have nipped a widespread dynamite plot in the bud. At Rotterdam, in addition to arresting Wallace and Kearney, the police captured a number of infernal machines and a quantity of correspondence, which is said to incriminate a number of people.

A semi-official communication upon the subject of the arrests was issued yesterday afternoon. It says: "There has been, within the full knowledge of the Scotland Yard officials for some time past, a gang busily engaged in America in preparing the ramifications for an extensive and diabolical plot to perpetrate a dynamite outrage in this country and establish a reign of terror. Gradually and quietly a large number of men were drawn around the plotters, and the fact being known that they were in intimate communication with prominent Russian nihilists in the United States enabled the police to pursue, investigate and discover on what is believed to be absolute evidence that on the recent developments of the scheme aimed at an outrage on the ear upon the occasion of his visit to England. The emissaries of Scotland Yard, however, dogged their every movement."

Bell was arraigned at the central police court yesterday and, after the usual formalities had been gone through with, the prisoner was remanded until Wednesday next. The alleged dynamite, was secured and unconcealed, was handcuffed while in court and guarded by two specially detailed policemen. The prisoner has very little to say about his being taken into custody. The only information which he has thus far vouchsafed is that he is not a British subject.

A dispatch from Boulogne-sur-Mer says that Tynan was arraigned there yesterday before the deputy police prosecutor. The proceedings were confined to furnishing evidence of the arrest and the establishment of the identity of the prisoner, which the latter fully admitted. Two Scotland Yard detectives were present at those formalities, and eventually the prisoner was remanded and taken to the town jail, while awaiting the arrival from London of the documents necessary to bring about his extradition.

It appears that Tynan, during his continental tour, passed himself off as a queen's messenger, or royal courier, and said that Bell, who was traveling with him, was his secretary. Tynan asserted that they were on their way to Copenhagen with an autograph letter from Queen Victoria to the czar. During his stay at Boulogne Tynan showed every evidence of being in possession of plenty of money and of having large funds to draw upon. He lived well, and his staple beverage was champagne.

Dispatches received from Brussels say that information obtained there from reliable sources indicates that the dynamites whose laboratory was discovered at Antwerp were not Fenians, but anarchists, whose aim was directed against the czar, and it is known that the police of Antwerp were informed by the Scotland Yard authorities that a plot was in preparation to try to assassinate the czar in London, because of the discovery of the dynamite bomb laboratory at Antwerp. Many bombs, it appears, had already been manufactured, and the police believe that one of the conspirators, who is believed to have fled to Breslau, has taken several infernal machines with him.

The police here now admit that the man arrested at Rotterdam, whose name was first given as Wallace, is, in fact, John P. Kearney of New York. Edward Bell, when arrested at Glasgow, had £100 in his purse.

The secretary of the Great Britain. Arrest of Tynan, says that he will afford Tynan means for his defense, but that he will have no sympathy if he has been guilty of any recent conspiracy.

Tynan's mother and her son, who are living at Kingsdown, near Dublin, declare that they never knew of his movements and that they supposed he was canvassing in the United States. His mother was preparing to go to New York to see him.

Tynan spent Saturday evening in the bar of the hotel, drinking and standing for drinks freely and talking politics. He retired to bed intoxicated at 2 o'clock in the morning. He was still under the influence of drink when he was arrested and he assumed his innocence till Detective Inspector Walsh resounded to him all recent movements, when he admitted his identity.

The formalities of extradition in Tynan's case will occupy a fortnight. The Chronicle says: "The plot was hatched in the drinking saloons of New York, and so openly and carelessly that every detail was known to the police from the inception of the scheme. Tynan might as well have proclaimed the plot from the house tops. It is all very strange and we want more light."

Discussed Railway Construction.
VANCOUVER, B. TRAGEDY ON THE SEA.

Wreck of an Italian Bark on the Massachusetts Coast.

SUICIDE OF CAPTAIN AND MATE.

Three Sailors Were Drowned and Seven Reached Shore in Safety—The Monte Tabor, from Trapani, Italy, Laden with Salt, a Complete Wreck.

HIGHLAND LIGHT, Mass., Sept. 15.—The Italian bark Monte Tabor, from Trapani for Boston, with a cargo of salt, was wrecked on Peaked Hill bar at midnight. A thick fog prevailed all night and although the crew of the Peaked Hill life saving station patrolled the beach constantly nothing was known of the disaster until some of the crew reached shore on pieces of the wreck. None of them could speak or understand English; the information gleaned from them was very meager. Afterwards a chest came ashore, evidently the property of the captain.

From documents found in it the name and destination of the vessel were learned. Later by signs the crew made known the action of the officers in committing suicide, their motions being taken at first to indicate that the captain had shot himself and that the mate had cut his throat. When two bodies with throats cut came ashore, however, it appeared that the dumb language had been misunderstood, and that both the mate and captain had killed themselves by throat cutting.

The dead are: Louis Genorio, captain, and Rappolla Giovanni, mate, by suicide; Oliver Mannoio, cook, Epileto Braggi and Bernello Capello, seamen, drowned. Soon after the seamen came ashore a boat's crew from the life saving station put off for the wreck, but they found nothing left. The vessel had gone to pieces almost immediately. The surviving members of the crew, numbering seven, are being cared for by the life savers.

The Monte Tabor left Trapani June 21. She is a wooden vessel of 505 tons gross. She is 133 feet long, 23 feet beam and 10 feet 7 inches depth of hold. She was built at Vercara and hailed from Genoa, Italy. Trapani is a port largely interested in the salt trade, and the Monte Tabor left there under favorable conditions. The time consumed on the voyage, according to expert seamen, was unmistakable evidence of her slowness. They say that an American bark of modern build could have completed the voyage several weeks ago.

Delaware Factions Trying to Compromise.

WILMINGTON, Del., Sept. 15.—The regular Republican electors from this district, William C. Spruance and Manlove Hayes, have sent a letter to the Adickes electors, James G. Shaw and D. M. Wilson, suggesting a compromise, so that there will be one set of McKinley electors in this state. It is first proposed that all four resign and have two other persons named by the national Republican committee, who, with Mr. Fooks, who is on both tickets, shall stand as the Republican candidate for elector. A second proposition is that one of the Adickes men and one of the regulars, to be designated by lot, shall resign, leaving Mr. Fooks and the other two as the Republican candidates for electors, the persons selected by either of these modes to stand as the Republican candidates and to be approved by the state central committee of both organizations. They are to pledge themselves, if elected, to vote for McKinley and Hobart. The regular state central committee is said to approve of the suggestions.

Laurada to be Released.

WILMINGTON, Del., Sept. 15.—Collector of the Port Townsend has been instructed by the Washington authorities to give clearance papers to the steamer Laurada as soon as they may be desired after the crew has been examined. Collector Townsend is now engaged in taking the depositions of the crew, with the purpose of obtaining evidence to be used at the hearing of Captain Murphy next Saturday. It was ascertained last night that in depositions made fourteen of the crew of the Laurada have admitted that on her last trip from Philadelphia she stopped at Barnegat and took on a cargo of boxes and a party of men. The contents of the boxes and the nationality of the men was not known, nor was their destination. The men and cargo were taken to Novassa Island, in the West Indies, and there transferred to a steamer, the name of which had been omitted.

Mr. Bryan in Louisville.

LOUISVILLE, Sept. 15.—The advent of the Bryan party into Kentucky was an enthusiastic one in the extreme. The people of Henderson brought out the 10,000 inhabitants of that city and borrowed nearly half as many more from the surrounding towns. The streets were blocked from the depot to the stand erected in the public square, where a mass of humanity was gathered. Mr. Bryan made two speeches, one from the city park and the other from a stand erected in one of the broad streets of that city. Southern enthusiasm was shown in the greatest degree and every one of the vast audience wanted to shake hands with the man whom they called the next president.
