THE COUNTY COURT.
Proceedings in the Criminal and Civil Branches.

POTTSVILLE, Sept. 15.—Among the cases before the Grand Jury yesterday was one in which Jacob Mitchell was charged with shooting and killing William Lasawickas on the morning of July 4th, last, in the latter's saloon on West Centre street, Shenandoah. A bill of involuntary manslaughter was returned and arrangements were made for the trial of the case to-day. M. M. Burke, Esq., of Shenandoah, represents the accused and is confident that the trial will result in nothing more than a matter of form and the acquittal of his client.

The shooting took place at one o'clock in the morning. Mitchell, who is a Lithuanian, was bartender for the deceased, who was also a Lithuanian, and the men were firm friends. A row started in the saloon and Mitchell went to the street to attract the attention of the police by firing shots from a revolver. Three discharges were made. The fourth cartridge refused to explode and Mitchell started back to the saloon with the intention of reloading the weapon. On the way he tried to learn why the remaining cartridge refused to explode and pulled the trigger of the revolver several times. He was entering the saloon when the last pull was given and the weapon was discharged. Lasawickas stood close to Mitchell and in line with the shot. The bullet entered his groin, perforated the intestines in ten different places and finally lodged against the second lumbar vertebra. Mitchell at once surrendered himself, but was released under \$1,000 bail pending the result of the injuries. Lasawickas died on the night of July 6th after exonerating Mitchell from any malicious intention. Mitchell surrendered himself after the victim's death, but the court subsequently released him under bail pending the trial, which is now about to be held.

Judge Bechtel announced several appointments in answer to petitions: Martin J. Lynch was appointed constable of the First ward of Ashland. Charles A. Beckley was appointed constable in the Fourth ward of Ashland. Frank Berger was appointed tax collector in the Borough of Landisville. All these appointments were made to fill vacancies.

Philip Partner was appointed guardian of Joseph Allen Glick, minor child of Jos. M. Glick, late of Girardville, deceased. A bond in the sum of \$900, with Chas. Barnhard as surety, was filed and approved.

W. D. Soltzer presented the petition of Clara Lewis, praying that a subpoena in divorce issue against her husband, on the ground of intolable treatment.

M. M. Burke presented an application for a charter for the Ingalas Beneficial Society of Gilberton.

In the matter of the application in case of Bridget Monaghan vs. Harrison Shupack, to have a writ of certiorari stricken off, the rule was not granted.

John Bolla, convicted of assault and battery upon the tax collector of Mahanoy City, was sentenced by Judge Bechtel to pay \$1 fine, costs and twenty days' imprisonment.

MARVELOUS CONTORTION.
A Man Who Gloriously Defies the Laws of Nature.

One of the most unique and marvelous exhibitions of contortion ever given in this town was witnessed last evening by a number of the medical profession in Dr. G. M. Hamilton's office, on North Jardin street. The subject was Harry S. Fitzgerald, of Philadelphia, who has been giving exhibitions of the same kind before medical societies, colleges and hospital staffs for the past 20 years. Many of the physicians last night recognized him as a subject they had seen in clinics during their college days in Philadelphia. The exhibition is not a pleasing one, but wonderful to a degree that excites deepest interest on the part of the medical profession. All the members present last night declared that Fitzgerald eclipsed anything ever demonstrated by or upon a living subject in their experience. The most wonderful feature of the man's performance was his ability to dislocate his joints and restore them to their proper position with equal facility. Giving his shoulder a sudden wrench a sharp grating sound was heard and as he stepped forward he was found to have dislocated the upper bone of the arm, the head of which was found to be in the armpit. Again it was thrown inward under the collar bone, and several physicians satisfied themselves by examinations that the dislocations were actually present.

The most wonderful performance was a successive dislocation of the hip, foot and knee, the hip being dislocated backward, the foot inward and a twist given to the knee, the whole being brought upon the chest, forming an apparent triple dislocation. Another interesting feature was the obliteration of the pulse at the wrist by contraction of the muscles and an obstruction to the flow of blood in the large veins of the leg, brought about by dislocating the thigh bone upon the pubis, thus interfering with the circulation.

Fitzgerald's feats of contortion are due to practice extending from childhood. He is now 51 years of age. His remuneration comes from the generosity of those who witness his feats. The audience last night comprised Drs. G. M. Hamilton, D. W. Stramb, J. S. and M. S. Kistler, J. S. Callen, G. F. Matter, D. W. Stein, R. Hochlerner, D. John Price, J. M. Monaghan, J. W. Erwin and J. W. VanValzah, Druggist C. H. Hagenbuch and E. W. Shoemaker, Esq., were also in attendance.

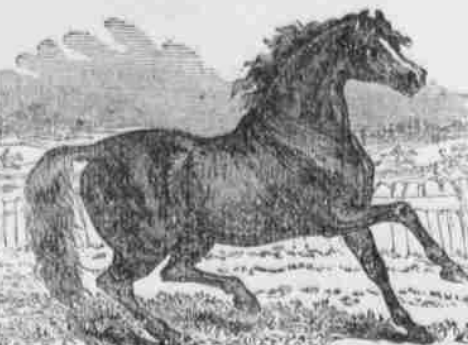
