Mr. Thacher became interested in the subject of tenement house reform and secured the passage of a bill appoin-ing a commission. In the spring of 1886 Mr. Thacher was elected mayor of Al-bany. In the fall of 1893 he was again elected mayor of Albany. His tarm will expire Jan 1, 1898.
