About double the number tried were not prosed. Among the cases not prosed was the one against David Detroy, of town, who was charged with stealing a cow from a man at Jackson and selling it at Sherrington. The costs in the case were paid. The same disposition was made of a case of malicious mischief against Ernest Hood and Jeremiah Brown, of town.

She was born in Patterson, near Tananqua, and had resided in this town 20 years. Her husband died about 30 years ago. The surviving children are William H. and Joseph L. Tempin and Mrs. Charles D. Hornberger, all of town. The funeral will take place tomorrow, at 1 p. m., from the residence of William H. Tempin, on North Catherine street.

Yekkois Convicted.
William Yekkois, of town, was convicted at the Pottsville court on Saturday on a charge of assault and battery with intent to ravish, on oath of Mary Williams. The woman came to this country but a short time ago to meet her husband, who was supposed to live in the neighborhood of town. While in search of her husband Mary, who is a Polish woman, met Yekkois, who volunteered to go with her to where her husband was stopping. She was overjoyed at the prospect of meeting her husband, from whom she had been separated for years and gladly accepted the defendant's offer. Subsequent events show that he had other motives in view. Instead of taking her to her husband he led her into the woods, where he attempted to take advantage of her. The case was tried before Judge Savidge, and after being out eight hours rendered a verdict of guilty as indicted.

Judge Savidge's Sharp Talk.
Two Poles named Joseph Martin and Adam Sopotski, convicted of assault and battery with intent to kill, made a plea for mercy at the Pottsville court on Saturday. Judge Savidge stated with much emphasis that foreigners are becoming a curse to the county and country. They were too ready to bring suits when there was no foundation in fact for such a course. They never wanted to pay any costs, preferring to go to jail and become a burden to the county. I have neither time or patience to waste on such trash. The defendants were then sentenced to each pay the costs, \$50 fine and stand committed until the sentence was complied with. Neither, however, had any money and they went to jail.

MURPHY'S CONDITION HOPELESS.
The Recently Released Irish Prisoner Is Undoubtedly Insane.
NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—Certain statements as to the whereabouts of John Murphy, better known as Albert G. Murphy, the recently released Irish-American prisoner, are incorrect. Several papers yesterday made a statement that he had been spirited away by Mr. Lyman, president of the Irish National alliance. When a representative of the Associated Press called at the residence of Murphy's sister, Mrs. Fagan, in Jersey City, last night, Mrs. Fagan said: "There is no truth whatever in the story that my brother has been spirited away, nor has he disappeared. He was here all day yesterday, and although I must say that his mental condition is anything but satisfactory to my sisters and myself, he seems to be rational on being questioned as to current events." Arrangements have been made for a careful examination to be made as to Murphy's sanity. Those who know Murphy very well, and wish him a better fate, say that his condition is more hopeless than that of his recently released fellow prisoner, Dr. Gallagher.

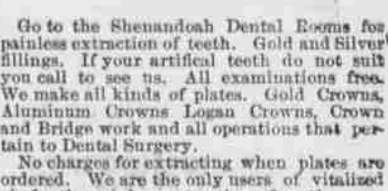
