RUSSIA'S CZAR IN PARIS

Frenchmen Arrange a Magnificent Reception for Their Ally.

THE CITY LAVISHLY DECORATED.

of Fireworks, in Which the Eiffel Tower Was Used to Add to the Glory of the

Pages, Oct. 7 .- The czar and czarina arrived here safely at Ransingn station from Cherbourg at 10 o'clock yesterday morn-ing. The weather was fine, and the count-less decorations showed up splendidly in the sunlight. Their majesties were accorded a most rapturous reception, and reached the Russian embassy, where they will reside during their visit to this city, at it o'clock. The crowds began gathering along the route of the procession shortly after daylight, and by S a. m. the whole route was througed with enthusias-

tie people.

A double line of troops held the route from the railroad depot to the embassy from shortly after 7 o'clock, and the soldiers were reinforced by lines of gendarmes, sergeants-de-ville and detectives.

The decorations eclipsed anything ever
seen in the French capital. Russian and
French flags entwined or floating side by
side predominated, but the trees, balconies, roofs, lampposts, statues, anything
and almost everything ways utilized in the and almost everything were utilized in the decorative effects planned to impress the czar with the enthusiasm of France at the visit of her friend and ally to Paris. The trees, bared of their natural foliage by the autumn blasts, were thickly covered with artificial leaves and flowers. Rostral col-umns, forty feet high, painted to imitate stone and surmounted by Russian double headed eagles, each six feet high, and supporting imperial crowns, lined the Champs

At Ranelagh the czar and czarina were welcomed by the presidents of the senate and the chamber of deputies, all the caband the chamber of deputies, at the con-tnet ministers, General Saussier, the mili-tary governor of Paris: Cardinal Richard, architishop of Paris: the civil and munici-pal authorities and other high officials. The formal presentations took place in a magnificent salon constructed expressly for that purpose.

They afterwards proceeded to the Elysee Palace in order to call on the presi-dent of the republic. There was a state dinner at the Elysee last night, and the day's ceremonies ended with a demi-gala performance at the opera.

crammed with the populace last night, reinforced by strangers to a number estimated as high as a million, to witness the illuminations of the city. Vehicular traffic was entirely suspended. As this gradually died away mighty streams of liquid flames appeared to cupty themselves from every platform of the fower and from the bridges into the diaziling waters of the Seine. Finally, the whole tower, from base to summit, was kindled into a blinding blaze, and 15,000 flying fuses and innunerable roman candles spring forth with dazzling splen-

MR. BRYAN IN INDIANA

His Reception at Indianapolis Like That at Boston.

MAKES MANY SPEECHES EN ROUTE.

At Seymony the Candidate Quotes from a Message of President Harrison in Support of His Argument for Expansion of The Currency.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 7.—The reception accorded William J. Bryas on his arrival in Indianapolis yesterday was mearly as great as any he has received during his course trip. He made five speeches here, two in the afterneon and three at night, and at each meeting he addressed immense audiences, one of which was nearly as large as that addressed by him on Boston Common, the largest of the campaign. The Bryan party was received at the sta-The Bryan party was received at the sin-tion with great enthusiasm from many thousands gathered about the station. He was taken immediately to the Grand hotel, and the parade from the depot to the hotel was a continuous ovation to the candidate, the principal thoroughfares be-lng so crowded that the sidewalks were roped off in order to keep the crowds from pressing upon the carriages.

After dinner Mr. Bryan addressed the largest crowd of the day at the state house. Every inch of available standing and elimbing room was taken. The park in front of the state house was packed with humanity, the streets on either side were crowded, and people were gathered in the windows of the buildings across the street in order to see the candidate, even if they could not hear him. Probably less than one-fourth of the audience heard his speech, but those who were able to get within the sound of his voice were en-thusiastic to a great degree.
