THE LITHUANIAN CHURCH CASE.

Johnson and Wilson Win, But the Verdict is Unsatisfactory. The famous case of J. W. Johnson and P. W. Wilson, the carpenters and builders of town, against Most Rev. P. J. Ryan, of Philadelphia, Archbishop, etc., congregation and pastor of St. George's Lithuanian Catholic church, et al., ended on Saturday at Pottsville by the jury rendering a verdict for the plaintiffs after deliberating all night. The verdict was for \$4,915, with interest from May 3rd, 1892, to October 9, 1896, making a total of \$5,927.49. The trial was before Judge Lyon, of Juniata county, and occupied about ten days. The suit was brought to recover for the erection of the Lithuanian Catholic church on South Jardin street. The church claimed that the erection was not in accordance with the contract, while the plaintiffs claimed that the erection was in accordance with the plans and specifications of E. X. Reilly, the architect. The case was arbitrated in 1893 and the builders were awarded \$7,230.67.

Smoke Causes Alarm.

Shortly after nine o'clock this morning the fire department was called to the Ferguson theatre building at the corner of Main and Oak streets. The alarm was caused by smoke issuing from the Oak street brick wall of that portion of the building occupied by Wood's Business College. After making an investigation the firemen left the place, satisfied that there was no danger, but were in no pleasant frame of mind, as they say, they have been given several fruitless runs to the building on account of the same trouble. The chimney on the Oak street side of the building is evidently in a defective condition and allows the smoke to escape so that it makes its way into the halls of the building and through the brick walls. The smoke does not escape in sufficient quantities to cause the occupants of the building any great inconvenience, however, but it is a case that the fire committee of the Borough Council should investigate and cause repairs to be made.

UNITED EVANGELICALS HAPPY.

They Will Soon Take Possession of Their New Church.

Rev. Swelgart, of Ashland, preached a powerful sermon to the Bethany United Evangelical congregation in Dougherty's hall yesterday morning and another in the evening, and also assisted the pastor, Rev. J. J. Reitz, in conducting communion after preaching at the latter service. Just before closing the evening service the pastor formally announced that the trustees of the congregation had purchased during the past week the church building formerly used by the English Lutheran congregation and it is expected that the edifice will be ready for occupancy in about six weeks. He urged upon each one in the congregation, as well as all friends, to give the trustees all the help they can.

This is a happy approach to the end of a long season of turbulent experience which the congregation has had through an unfortunate split at the head of the old church. It was originally precipitated by a dispute between factions as to where the general conference should be held. One faction, adherents of Bishop Dubs maintained that it should be held in the Eastern Pennsylvania District; the adherents of Bishop Escher and Bowman claimed Illinois was the proper place. Each faction stood by its claims and two conferences were held. The matter was carried into the courts and the Escherite faction was sustained, its conference being declared the legal one. This faction then called upon the opposing congregations to come within its jurisdiction, or forfeit their charters and properties but this all the Dubs congregations refused to do. Some at once made the forfeitures, but others held out, the members of the congregations claiming that they had built their churches by individual contributions and that they were the real owners of the properties. One of these was the Shenandoah congregation. The matter was again carried into the courts and the claims of the Escherite factions were again sustained. It was stated that inasmuch as the congregation had placed the properties in the name of the general conference and the Escherites had been declared the legal head of that conference they were entitled to the properties. The Shenandoah congregation, like many others in the state, vacated. The church, parsonage, etc., at the corner of Cherry and West streets was left to the Escherites and they now hold it. The old congregation had held it for over twenty years and invested in it from \$20,000 to \$25,000. The property consists of a church, two dwellings under it, on the West street side, and a parsonage and dwelling for the janitor on the Cherry street side. Only a year before the property was vacated about \$2,000 had been spent in improvements. The feeling of the old congregation was so strong in favor of Bishop Dubs that not one was left to stand by the old church and they reorganized as the Bethany United Evangelical church. It is about a year since the objection took place and during that time the congregation has been whittling in Dougherty's hall.

The church just purchased is located on North Jardin street, between Centre and Lloyd streets. It is a very neat little edifice, but must be enlarged to accommodate the new owners. It is understood the front will be brought flush with the street and an addition of 20 feet will be added to the rear. It will also be necessary to remodel the interior of the edifice to some extent, in order to afford room for the Sunday school independent of the general assembly room. This will probably be provided for by a portable partition. Definite plans for the change have not been made, however, but workmen will begin at once to make excavations for the addition at the rear. The sentiment of the public is strongly in favor of the congregation and little difficulty will be experienced in securing help to pay for the church and improvements. In one day last week the pastor raised \$1,500 by subscription. Several members of the congregation have already subscribed sums ranging from \$50 to \$500.

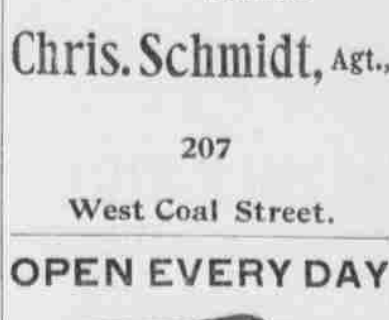
