Republican Mass Meeting To-night.
Congressman Charles N. Brumm arrived in town this afternoon from Canton, O., where he introduced the delegation from Luzerne, Schuylkill and Northumberland counties to ex-Governor William McKinley, the Republican candidate for President. In acknowledging the introduction the candidate spoke of Congressman Brumm as a friend with whom he had many years of pleasant intercourse in Congress. Mr. Brumm and Dr. J. Czapke, late of Philadelphia, will address a meeting in Robbins' opera house to-night and speeches will be made in the Polish, Lithuanian and English languages. The Lithuanian band will attend.

Finger Amputated.
John Sapulsky, an inside employe at Cambridge colliery, suffered the loss of the index finger of the left hand and sustained lacerations of the right hand by a fall of coal at the colliery this morning. He is under the treatment of Dr. J. C. Church.

Funeral.
The funeral of Nellie Coogan, a 9-year-old child who died from spinal meningitis, took place at 2:30 this afternoon from the residence of the parents, on West Coal street. Interment was made in the Annunciation cemetery.

Arm Amputated.
Alex. Rogers, a Polish miner employed at Bear Ridge colliery, was injured by a fall of coal at the Bear Ridge colliery yesterday afternoon. His left arm was amputated at the Miners' hospital. The victim resides at Mahanoy Plane.

Miners' Hospital.
There were several admissions to the State Hospital, Fountain Springs, yesterday, and the usual quota of dispensary cases. The admissions were as follows: William Ellis, 24, Ashland, moulder, severe sprain of the knee joint, received while playing ball; Anthony Drangalis, 36, Shenandoah, miner, Ellangowan colliery, burns of the face, neck, hands, arms and back, caused by explosion of gas. Drangalis was sweeping the gas from a roadway when the explosion occurred; John Wolinski, 20, Gilberton, miner, Draper colliery, burns of the face, neck, hands, arms and back, caused by gas; Peter D. Geiger, 24, Tanawana, brakeman, Reading Railroad, arm twisted off near the shoulder in a wreck near Potts Grove. The member was amputated. Every bone in the left arm, but the part of one, was crushed; Michael Kaleigh, 49, Pappahannock, was climbing a ladder at his home four weeks ago when it broke. In striking the ground Kaleigh sustained severe bruises of the back, and is now suffering from partial paralysis of the legs and forearms and his whole system is shocked.


