# BRYAN IN MICHIGAN.

The Democratic Candidate Still Talking to Big Crowds.

SPOKE AT FOURTEEN PLACES.

The Most Enthusiastic Andience on the He Ended His Day's Work, Begun Early in the Morning.

MARQUETTE, Mich., Oct. 15.—William J. Beyan arrived here at 0 o'clock last night, after a day of many speeches, and met with a most onthusiastic reception. He had spoken during the day at Iron-He had spoken during the day at Iron-wood, Bessemer, Watermeet, Iron River, Escanada, Iron Mountain, Norway, Pow-ers, Escanaba, Ishpeming and Negaunce, Mich., and at Florence, Wis. At all places except Ishpeming his reception was most flattering, but at Marquette there was as-sembled the most enthusiastic crowd of the day. In the course of his speech here be said:

"In no campaign since the war have the people been so aroused to a sense of na-tional danger as they are aroused this year. Our opponents tell us that the success of our cause would mean great friury to this country. We reply that twenty years of experience in their cause has been of incalculable harm to our country. They rell us that the free coinage of silver will bring trouble. We rell them that the gold standard has brought trouble. We place the experience of our people against the prophecies which they make. They tell us that the free coinage of silver may not be free from dangers. They tell us that it may be a perfect system. We tell them that we do not have to offer a perfect system. At Watermeet Mr. Bryan spoke in a conversational tone from the rear platform to a few hundred enthusiasts. He said: "In studying the money question there is one thing that you must learn before anything else can be learned, and that is that you can affect the value of the dollar when you affect the number of dollars. The difference between our plan lars. The difference between our plan and the national bank plan is this: We have greenbacks out now, and those green-backs draw no interest and the govern-ment pays no one. When you retire those greenbacks with an issue of bonds, and then let the banks taste money on the bonds, the banks will then draw from the people of the country their interest, which the people now have. It is good for the banks, but hard on the people."

In his speechat Iron River Mr. Bryan said:

"The money question has never been sub-mitted to the American people as it is today since the time of Andrew Jackson. Arthat time the people met and discussed and decided whether a national bank should run the country, and in this campaign they are discussing and are going to de-cide whether the financiers shall run this country in the interests of foreign finan-ciers or whether the American people shall run it themselves in their own interest"
