MAHANAY CITY.

Two Alarms of Fire Stir up the Neighboring Town.

MAHANAY CITY, Oct. 15.—An unsuccessful search was made here last night for Laura Schmitz, daughter of Henry Schmitz, of Ashland. She ran away from home with \$100 belonging to her father. The girl was traced to this town, Shenandoah, (Glendeville, and back to Shenandoah, where it was learned that a girl answering Laura's description had purchased a railroad ticket for New York. It is believed she has gone there to try and see some of the children who were at Ashland last summer as guests of the Tribune Press-Ad Fund. The girl figured in a similar escapade about a year ago and was brought back from Williamsport.

A lamp exploded in the saloon of Joseph Stock, at the corner of Centre and Main streets, yesterday afternoon, but the fire was extinguished by a man in the saloon.

An overhauled pipe started a fire in the residence of Louis Kimball, on East Centre street, but a bucket brigade prevented the flames from doing much damage.

Early this morning thieves broke into the ivory stable office of Smith & Campion, but after rummaging closets and drawers were obliged to leave without securing anything of value.

Cave-in at St. Nicholas.
A large cave-in occasioned by the workings of the St. Nicholas colliery took place last night and carried down an area of surface 175 feet long and 150 feet wide. The breach is 45 feet deep and several thousand feet of cut timber went down with the surface, as the affected part was in a place used by the P. & O. The breach extends to the rear parts of houses occupied by James Kennedy, Patrick Conners, Mrs. Mary Furlong, William Hininger and Charles O'Neill. The surface commenced to subside at 11 o'clock last night and continued working until about 6 o'clock this morning. The noise made by the falling timber aroused the whole patch at an early hour. The breach is located about 20 feet from the P. & O. depot.

UNION VETERANS' LEGION.

A Gratifying Increase in the Membership of the Organization.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—The eleventh annual encampment of the National Union Veterans' Legion is in session here. The report of the secretary shows the addition of five encampments during the past year and an increase of 7 1/2 per cent in the total memberships, making 64 encampments in all, and giving the order a membership of 8,725.

Yesterday afternoon was devoted to a parade through the principal streets of the city, the president reviewing the marchers from the portico of the executive mansion.

The procession was not notable for its length, but it was imposing on account of the exceptionally good personal appearance of the participants. The orderly manner in which they marched, and also because of the escort of United States troops. Most of the veterans were gray haired, and some of them limped as they walked, but they conducted themselves in a manner which would have done credit to them thirty years ago.

Twenty-three minutes were consumed in passing the White House while the president stood in the portico bowing to each separate detachment, acknowledging flag salutes and smiling in response to the bows of personal acquaintances in the line of march. The review was witnessed by a large gathering of spectators.

Death from a Singular Cause.

NOBLESBURG, Pa., Oct. 15.—Mrs. Laura A. Saylor, the young wife of George A. Saylor, came to her death from a singular cause. Last week she gave birth to twins, and while suffering from the pains of childbirth she bit off the end of her tongue. Blood poisoning followed, and the unfortunate woman died yesterday in great agony.

Gold Democrats Win in Court.

BROOKLYN, Oct. 15.—The appellate division of the supreme court, sitting in Brooklyn, decided that the "National Democratic party" has a right to use that title on the official ballot, and that it will not be an infringement upon the regular Democratic party's right. An appeal will probably be taken to the court of appeals.

The Susquehanna River Rising.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Oct. 15.—As a consequence of the recent heavy rains the Susquehanna river is rising very rapidly. At 10 o'clock last night the water was eleven feet above low water mark, and is still rising.
