**MAHANOY CITY.**

**A Well-Known and Respected Resident Died Last Evening.**

MAHANOY CITY, Oct. 22.—Margaret, wife of Joseph G. Morgan, the North Main street merchant, and a highly respected christian woman, died last evening after an illness of about two years. The deceased was a member of the Welsh Congregational church. The funeral will take place at 2 p. m. on Saturday. Rev. F. Tyle Evans, of Lansford, and Lost Lake will officiate at the ceremonies. The deceased leaves two sons besides her husband.

The friends of Mrs. Ellen Riordan and her son, Daniel, victims of the Mahanoy Plane fire, took place this morning from the residence of Mrs. Riordan's sister, Mrs. James Smith, in Mahanoy Plane. High mass was celebrated in Holy Rosary Catholic church, Revs. McLoughlin and Prendergast officiating. The teachers and pupils of the public schools of Mahanoy Plane attended the funeral in a body. The pall bearers were John Walker, John Meade, Martin Ryan, James McConnell, Miles Brennan and John Broody. Interment was made at Pockville.

The funeral of Albert Becker took place this morning from the family residence at Park Place, Rev. E. C. Byers, of Park Place and Delano, officiating at the service. The remains were brought to town via Lehigh Valley railroad and transferred to the P. & E. passenger station and taken to Bernsville, where service was held and interment made at the white church, Rev. Henry, pastor of the Evangelical church of town, officiating at the second service.
