**AN EASY DAY FOR BRYAN**  
He Starts the Week with Only Nine Speeches.

**HE ADDRESSES COLLEGE STUDENTS**

The Democratic Candidate Meets the Scholars of the College from Which He Himself Graduated—Monster Audiences Greet Him at Jacksonville and Alton.

JACKSONVILLE, Ill., Oct. 27.—Jacksonville was very much alive yesterday. It was decorated with flags and bunting, and a great many of the residences bore the pictures of Bryan and Alford. The streets were crowded with a mass of humanity wearing ribbons of silver, and many of the enthusiasts had headgear made of the white metal. The stand erected in the center of the city square was surrounded long before noon with people anxious to see and hear the standard bearer of three parties, notwithstanding that his speech did not commence till after 2 o'clock. Crowded excursion trains began to arrive early in the day, and continued until long after noon. The candidate made two public speeches in this city.

The ovation given Mr. Bryan was one of the greatest he has received anywhere in a city of anywhere near the size of Jacksonville. There was a parade during the day which would have done credit for a town much larger than Jacksonville. There was a noticeable number of yellow ribbons scattered through the crowd, but they were in the minority. Mr. Bryan was introduced by Judge O. P. Thompson in a short, flattering speech, and when he took the stand to speak he was cheered wildly. He said in part:

"It is gratifying to meet again the friends whom I used to know and to learn by their presence and their words that the acquaintance then formed is continued, and that the good will so often manifested then is still evident. I come back as the representative of a great principle, as the champion of a great cause, as the candidate of those who believe that the American people are able to attend to their own business. If there is any one in Missouri county who believes that seventy millions of people must bow their knee to foreign nations and bend their necks to a foreign yoke, I cannot expect those people to vote for me this year, because I do not believe that we should submit ourselves to foreign domination."

"The national parties declared the money question to be the paramount issue of the campaign, and those bolting Democrats who went over to help the Republicans, without having the courage to call themselves Republicans, also declared that the money question was the paramount issue, and yet our opponents, when they find themselves unable to meet the argument in favor of bimetallicism, when they find themselves unable to convince the American people that our finances are safest when in the hands of syndicates, now turn to the people of this country and say that the election of the Chicago ticket is a menace to our form of government. We are prepared to meet our enemies on any battlefield, but we want them to be distinctly understood that, no matter how badly they have been defeated in argument, that they have got to face this money question for one week more before the American people."

Mr. Bryan then defended the plank in the Chicago platform relating to the income tax and the criticism of the supreme court. He quoted the dissenting opinion of Justice Brown and then went on to reply to the charge that the Democrats were trying to array class against class. Previous to his public address Mr. Bryan visited the Illinois state college. Perhaps the noisiest demonstration that ever was given anywhere within the walls of the chapel was the one paid him by the students of his alma mater. He spoke to the students of the college from which he graduated and the applause which greeted him seemed out of place in the room devoted to the devotional exercises of the institution. His address, while of a political nature, and a defense of the double standard theory of finance, was so diplomatically given that no student within his hearing could take offense at it.

There were four short stops made by Mr. Bryan between Jacksonville and Alton. At Roodhouse, where a five minute stop was made, a good sized assemblage, among which there was a liberal sprinkling of yellow ribbons, greeted the candidate. He spoke from the platform for a few moments, his speech being of the same general tenor as his ordinary talk of the car address. Godfrey, Jerseyville and Kane turned out fair sized crowds to cheer Mr. Bryan as he appeared at the back of the car. Two speeches were made at Alton last night, one from either side of the city hall building. Large and enthusiastic audiences testified to their approval.

**CANTON OVERWHELMED**  
Many Visitors Open the Last Week of the Campaign.

**THEY CAME FROM SEVEN STATES.**  
Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois. Send Delegations to Cheer the Republican Standard Bearer.

CANTON, Oct. 27.—The largest crowds in Canton have been witnessed most generally to Saturday. Yesterday, however, was a surprise, even to the much surprised Cantons. Organized delegations came from Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois. The day was fair and the processions of unusual brilliancy. The New Jersey Feedinghouse Lancers set the style, and the day throughout was distinguished by the most handsome paraphernalia yet seen. The Erie railway employees' delegation was numbered by thousands.

After Major McKinley returned from attending the funeral of his late friend, Dr. K. Miller, the paraders began their marches. They stood in waiting on North Market street in double line from the McKinley home to the court house, a half mile straight away. They gathered and peeped, and swayed about the house so that speaking from the porch, to be heard by so vast a crowd, was impossible. The temporary reviewing platform used on Saturdays is not allowed to stand after the day is over. There was, however, no place to speak from but the porch. Tables had to be carried from the house to improve a rostrum, so that the people jammed and crossed the streets and crowded upon the lawns of neighbors' houses might hear.

The women as well as the men in the railway delegations each carried an American flag. These were waved vigorously. Torpedo cars were exploded, rockets fired, buzzards and tin horns were blown, while drums added to the enthusiasm of the scenes. Nearly all of the introductory speeches referred to the covert charge of Mr. Bryan, and several opponents challenged the proof for a single word of veracity. Major McKinley again referred to the charge of forcing employees.

To the delegation from Esomont, Washington, and Mr. Verman, Ind., composed mainly of railroad employees. Major McKinley said in part:

"There are some people who seem to think that the best way to get on in this world is to be against one another, and there is a natural antagonism between those who employ labor and those who are employed. They are disturbed whenever they discover that the employer of labor and labor itself are on good terms, and whenever that occurs they commence crying coercion. It is not coercion, it is cooperation, the one working with the other for the public good and for their advantage generally. We do not want in this country antagonism between capital and labor; they ought to be close together all the time. The man cannot get on without the other, and instead of their being enemies they ought always to be friends."

"Instead of encouraging sympathy between them, which we all ought always to advocate, there are those who would create antipathy between them; for example, between railroad managers and those who are employed by the railroads. Now, I do not believe in any such doctrine myself. I believe in the common brotherhood of man. I believe that labor gets on best when capital gets on best, and that capital gets on best when labor is paid the most. Instead of there being a natural antagonism there is a natural alliance between them, and the people who are forever seeking to create antagonisms between those who employ labor and those who are employed are the people who never give any employment to labor at all."

"What we want in this country, and I am now addressing the Sound Money club of the Baltimore and Ohio Southwestern railway alone, is first confidence—confidence in each other, confidence in the credit of the country, confidence in the future, confidence in our money, confidence that if we invest our money today we will get something out of it at the end of the year. If we have not any confidence of that kind no one will feel like investing money, and if money is not invested there is no employment for labor."

"Then, too, as your spokesman has well said, we want a tariff that will raise enough money to keep the government out of debt. We do not want any more debts and deficiencies either in the treasury or among the people. We must pay as we go. The labor of this country was never so independent or its prospects so good as during the thirty-three years when we were under a protective policy and on a sound money basis. Labor never had so many comforts, and the homes of our laboring men so much cheer, hope and contentment as during these thirty-three years. Four years ago we abandoned that policy. A good many men who voted to abandon it would be glad to have voted at any time within the last three years for a policy that would have always given us a chance to vote it back."

"We want to teach a reverence for public law and to stand firmly for tranquility against violence. We want to stand by the great incorruptible judiciary of the country, which is our bulwark of safety in every hour of trouble and peril. We do not want any dishonest dollars. I like the name of your club, 'Sound Money.' We do not want anything unsound in this government. We want a dollar that is as good as gold, and just as good in the hands of the poor as in the hands of the rich. The first intimation that a poor, depreciated, devalued dollar reforms is to find its way into the hands of poor men who cannot afford to lose it. This has been the strand of poor dollars ever since the government began. The poorest dollar always eventually land in the pockets of the poorest people."
