NEW SCHOOL BUILDING ACCEPTED.
Step Taken at a Special School Board Meeting.

A special meeting of the School Board was held last evening for the purpose of again considering the acceptance of the new White street school building. The meeting was attended by Directors Ogden, Lee, Sullivan, Lamb, Morgan, O'Brien, Conners, Hinton, Edwards, Devitt, Price and Williams. The meeting was called to order at 7:30, President Price being detained from the meeting at the time.

The committee on building and repairs reported that the new structure was completed and that the balance on the contract was \$13,700, was due. The balance amounts \$1,930. On motion of Mr. O'Brien, seconded by Mr. Morgan, the building was accepted.

Superintendent Bogart stated that the first second primary grade schools were crowded by children residing in the southern part of the town and that it was absolutely necessary that the first and second grade primary schools now in the Jarrett street building be transferred to the new White street school building to make room for the primary grades in the former building, as ordered.

The new building is to be put in condition for opening of schools in next Monday morning.
