KAISER SUSPECTED OF MURDER

The Alleged Victim of Highwaymen May
Have Killed His Wife.

Northtown, Pa., Oct. 31.—Although no
warrant for his arrest has been issued,
Charles O. Kaiser is detained at police
headquarters on suspicion of having mur-
dered his young wife, Emma, Wednesday
night. He emphatically protests his inno-
cence, and maintains his original story
that the crime was committed by two
highwaymen, who held them up on the
lonely road near Bridgetown.

Yesterday detectives made a search and
found the supposed stolen watch and pocket-
book hidden under a stone near where the
robbery was supposed to have been com-
mitted. A thirty-two calibre revolver, with
two chambers empty, was found about
sixty yards away.

After the tragedy Kaiser behaved as
though he had lost all recollection of his
wife's death, feigning to believe that he
regarded her as unconscious and was im-
patiently awaiting intelligence of her con-
dition. He played to perfection the role
of a person crazed by grief and anxiety,
and for a dual purpose he was put under
the influence of opiates. While he was
sleeping soundly Captain Rodenbaugh
and Coroner Kurtz were recovering the
alleged stolen articles, making a discovery
that completely breaks down Kaiser's
story of robbery by highwaymen.

Kaiser and his wife carried a joint in-
surance of \$10,000 on their lives, the poli-
cies being so written that the death of
either would make the other beneficiary.
Kaiser is 34 years old, and his wife was a
youngster.

Notwithstanding late developments the
police are keeping a close watch for sus-
picious characters. One man, who gave
his name as George Hofer, of Manayunk,
was arrested yesterday. He protests
his innocence, and the police are inclined
to believe him.

DEADLY CYCLONES.

Louisiana, Mississippi and Okla-
homa Devastated.

SEVERAL DEATHS IN OKLAHOMA.

Buildings Lifted Into the Air and Smashed
Into Splinters—Destructive Work of
Wind in Texas Parish, La.—A Missis-
sippi Candidate Blown Away.

GETTIE, O. T., Oct. 30.—A cyclone
swept over a stretch of country about
twenty miles east of here at 7:30 o'clock
Wednesday night, devastating a distance
several miles long and probably a hun-
dred yards wide. The farm house of Wil-
liam Toby was first in the path of the
storm. The building was destroyed and
Mr. Toby was probably fatally injured.
The other members of his family escaped.
Half a mile further north the Mitchell
postoffice and store was lifted bodily into
the air, carried a hundred yards and
dashed to the earth. The building was
smashed into splinters, and Postmaster
M. T. Mullin and his wife, who lived in
the building, were killed. Their bodies
were found yesterday morning. They died
clashed in each other's arms. Two sticks
were driven into Mr. Mullin's skull, but
there was not a scratch on the body of his
wife.

The farm house of Abner Jones was also
wrecked and many smaller buildings were
destroyed, trees uprooted and crops ruined.

Rumors were current that the same
storm did frightful damage further east
in Payne county, and that several persons
were killed there, but up to a late hour no
particulars are obtainable.

There was a tremendous fall of rain here
and considerable damage was done by
washouts and the carrying off of crops.

At nine No. 12, near Krebs, it is re-
ported that five people were killed.

In Lincoln county Mr. and Mrs. John
McLaughlin have been found dead in the
rubble of their home, and Harrison Jones
will die of his injuries.

THE LOUISIANA CYCLONE.

Two Women and a Baby Blown Over-
board and Drowned.

NEWELLTON, La., Oct. 30.—Tensas parish
has again been visited by a most de-
structive cyclone yesterday. Telegraph
wires were torn down, and a most uncer-
tain report reaches here from the ter-
minal of the parish, where the tornado
originated. Information reaches here
that the immense brick gin on the
mound plantation, belonging to Mr. Joe
Curry, was practically destroyed. The
source of the storm, was from southwest
to northeast, striking Bruen lake at
Leust Land, tearing down and destroying
the public bridge over Choctaw bayou.
Twelve cabins in Leust Land were com-
pletely demolished, and one colored wo-
man was instantly killed and several
blown into the lake.

At Johnson's Bend, on Lake St. Joseph,
the gin house was totally wrecked. Three
large cotton gins were also destroyed and
a great deal of corn was blown away.
Six cabins were in its path and all were
blown to pieces entirely, and many tim-
bers were blown into Lake St. Joseph.
The tenants living in the houses had their
clothing and household effects blown
away. The public road on Lake St. Joseph
front is covered with fragments of houses,
furniture, clothing, cotton, corn and
household effects. There were two deaths
of colored men at Johnson's Bend, and
two colored women and a baby from
Leust Land were drowned in Lake Bruen,
where they were carried by the fury of the
elements.

A "TWISTER" IN NEW ORLEANS.

The Property Loss in That City Estimated
at \$100,000.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 30.—About 4:30
o'clock yesterday afternoon a cyclone, or
twister, struck this city on the river front,
just above Penitentiary street, and swept
over a distance of about a mile and a half,
or thirty blocks from Penitentiary street
to Robin street, the track of the storm being
about 1,500 feet wide from the river to An-
nunciation street. The first building dam-
aged was the Independence Oil mill. It
was unroofed, and the building and con-
tents damaged to the amount of \$6,000.

The conveyors of the new elevator of the
Illinois Central railroad were slightly
damaged and John Whittemeyer and John
T. Buck, employed at the elevator, were
lifted from the ground and dashed against
the elevator, and the latter severely hurt.

Hundreds of buildings in the track of
the storm were damaged, many being
partially unroofed and chimneys pro-
truding, trees uprooted and fences blown
down. The storm swept section left the
city in darkness last night, owing to the
prostration of electric light wires. The
property loss is estimated at \$100,000. A
number of cotton sheds were completely
destroyed. George Bealer and Joseph
Humessey were seriously injured.
