MR. BRYAN AT HOME.

Asserts Unshaken Confidence in the Success of the Ticket.

LAST DAY DEVOTED TO NEBRASKA.

He Urges All Members of Silver Clubs Throughout the United States to Devote the Whole of Election Day to the Cause.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 2.—Mr. and Mrs. Bryan reached their home in this city at 10 o'clock yesterday, after an absence of several weeks' duration. In order to be able to spend the day with their children it was necessary for Mr. Bryan to depart from the rule which he has invariably followed since his nomination, of not traveling on Sunday. They came from Council Bluffs, where they spent Saturday night with friends, on their special train, covering the distance in little over an hour. There were no stops or demonstrations on the way, as it was not known in advance whether the home coming would occur Saturday night or Sunday.

There was quite an assemblage of personal friends at the Lincoln station, and the candidate and his wife were welcomed by many cordial handshakes. Immediately upon their arrival they were ushered into a carriage and driven directly to their own residence. Mr. Bryan might have been anything but a presidential candidate, so quietly was the day spent after reaching home. There were a few callers, but they consisted for the most part of fellow townsmen, and none of them spent more than sufficient time to inquire after the personal welfare of Mr. and Mrs. Bryan. Mr. Bryan confessed to all that he felt the need of securing a good day's rest. He accordingly retired early in the afternoon, and was still sleeping at 5 o'clock, Mrs. Bryan standing guard at the door to prevent interruption of any kind.

In the few words that he did speak to callers Mr. Bryan asserted his unshaken confidence in the success of his cause, and he has never since the beginning of the campaign appeared more cheerful or more hopeful than he was today. He believes the people are thoroughly aroused, and will sustain him at the polls, but said that if perhaps they should fail to do so he would by no means consider the cause of bimetalism lost. He thinks that in the contingency of defeat at this time immediate preparations should be begun for the campaign of 1900.

The last day of the campaign will be devoted wholly to Mr. Bryan's own state and will be a long and busy one. Leaving Lincoln at 6:30 a. m. this morning he goes westward as far as Grand Island, and from that point returns over another railroad line in time to reach Lincoln at 5:30, making speeches of a few minutes' duration at all important points going and coming. He will stop at Lincoln on his return long enough to make a last address to the people of his home town, and will then proceed to Omaha, where, between the hours of 7 and 12 o'clock tonight, he is expected to make from five to seven speeches. Immediately after the last speech in Omaha Mr. Bryan will return again to Lincoln, so as to be here to vote tomorrow. Mrs. Bryan will accompany her husband through the state, but will not go to Omaha with him.

Mr. Bryan last night sent the following dispatch to Mr. Jones, chairman of the National committee, at Chicago: "I suggest that you urge all members of silver clubs throughout the United States to give the entire day, Tuesday, if possible, to our cause. In states where the bidding Democrats have been allowed to use the party name it will be necessary for our people to warn voters against the deception and at all polling places they will be useful to meet the misrepresentations which may be circulated too late to be answered by our speakers or through the press. The gold syndicate and the trusts are fighting for existence and we must be prepared to meet them at every point."

Closely Followed by Gold Democrats. OMAHA, Nov. 2.—One of the most exciting as well as immensely interesting features of this campaign will occur today when William J. Bryan, in his rapid flight through Nebraska will be closely followed by Hon. John P. Irish, of California. Shortly after Mr. Bryan has commenced his address the special train carrying Mr. Irish and other gold standard orators of Nebraska will follow him closely.

He closed his speaking engagements at Laporte Saturday. I hope that Missouri will do the same, and I feel confident that there is a chance of saving Nebraska."

SERMON BY CARDINAL GIBBONS

Upon the Approaching Presidential Election—An Impartial Discourse.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 2.—Cardinal Gibbons in his sermon at the cathedral yesterday morning took occasion to touch lightly, and in a thoroughly impartial way, upon the approaching presidential election and its results.

He spoke in highest terms of the many good qualities of the American people, such as their fundamental belief in religion, their love of fair play, their intelligence and their courage. He then went on to say: "We are on the eve of a presidential election, both great parties contending for the mastery. They are having no stone-throwing looking on and witnessing the violent denunciations that one party is uttering against the other and the terrible predictions as regard to the future of the country if the other party were to win would think that we were on the verge of a dreadful revolution."

"On next Wednesday morning he would find it was but a bloodless revolution, one effected not by bullets, but by ballots. A man is to be chosen to the highest position in the gift of his fellows, and important issues are at stake. Yet on Wednesday morning the minority will bow gratefully to the will of the majority, the country will survive and the nation will flourish and be perpetuated. Is this not good evidence that we are subject to the law? And the people that bow so to civil law are not the kind to reject divine law."

Found Deceased in Tennessee. CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—Albert T. Powers, manager of the Cuban relief bureau of this city, has been found deceased in Tennessee. News of his discovery was telegraphed to the Chicago police yesterday by Colonel J. D. Powers, of Owensboro, father of the man whose disappearance from Chicago a month ago mystified all the police and the friends of the missing man. Colonel Powers' telegram contained no details of his son's condition or whereabouts, and does not name the city in which he was found. The disappearance of young Powers just after launching of the ambitious project of the Cuban relief bureau gave rise to a belief at first that he had been murdered. Colonel J. D. Powers, father of the young man, is president of the First National bank at Owensboro, Ky.

Woman in Jail for Forgery. WOODBURY, N. J., Nov. 2.—Judith Carson, who gained notoriety as the star witness in the Gans murder trial, which resulted in the acquittal of Patrick Kerwin, two years ago, was brought to the county jail under a charge of forgery. The complaint is made by J. Allen Chatten, a contractor and builder of Paulsboro, where the woman resides. It is charged that she used Chatten to recover on a note for \$200, but Chatten declared that his signature to the note was a forgery, and presented the matter to the grand jury. The case may come up for trial at the present term of court, and every development will be looked for.

Daring Attempt to Rob a Postoffice. WILKESBARRE, Pa., Nov. 3.—A daring attempt was made early in the morning to rob the postoffice at Plymouth. The door of the big safe was blown off with such force that it shook the building and surrounding buildings. People living in the vicinity thought an earthquake had occurred, and they hastily dressed and came out on the streets. Smoke was seen coming from the postoffice, and the fire department was called out. It was found that sparks from the powder had set fire to the mail bags. The flames were soon extinguished. Postmaster Callery, upon his arrival, found all the valuables in the safe untouched. The robbers evidently got scared at the loud report and fell. No arrests have been made as yet.
