THE SULTAN'S PLEDGES.

Frightened Into Promises of Sweeping Reforms.

THE FRENCH WERE DETERMINED.
The Turkish Ruler Fears the Wrath of European Powers, and Presents a List of Proposed Reforms to M. Hanotaux, French Minister of Foreign Affairs.

PARIS, Nov. 9.—When the sultan received an account of the recent speech delivered by M. Hanotaux, minister of foreign affairs, in the chamber of deputies, Nov. 3, upon the Armenian question, he sent his secretary to M. Jules Cambon, the French ambassador to Turkey, to inquire concerning the matter. In his speech before the chamber, M. Hanotaux declared that the excesses of the Ottoman government had furnished legitimate motives for complaint. He also stated that a concert had been established among the powers, and that in October, 1895, an understanding had been reached with the port to the effect that the latter should grant reforms which unhappily had not been applied.

M. Hanotaux announced that, owing to the anarchy which reigned in the administrative spheres of Turkey, troubles had ensued, and France was bound to use language the strength and significance of which Turkey must understand. The powers, M. Hanotaux said, were convinced of the necessity of their solid union, but there must be no isolated action and no interference with the integrity of the Ottoman empire.

In conclusion the minister of foreign affairs announced that during the czar's visit a precise exchange of views had occurred, and that a united Europe would be able to show the sultan that he must give his subjects security and peace. When the representative of the sultan conferred with M. Cambon, at Paris, he was informed by the French ambassador to Turkey that under instructions it was stated that it was imperative that the sultan must adopt a certain number of measures calculated to reassure the public and give Europe satisfaction. The Turkish envoy to Paris, Muntir Bey, has now informed M. Hanotaux that the sultan upon the receipt of M. Cambon's message immediately decided to adopt the following measures:

The liberation from the prisons of the Ottoman empire of all persons against whom no charges have been preferred. The issuance of the police of orders that all peaceable Armenians must not be persecuted. The immediate convocation of the Armenian national assembly for the purpose of electing a patriarch.

It is also announced that Mazhar Bey, who was accused of being responsible for the murder of Father Salvator, would be tried by court martial. The Vall of Diarbekir will be dismissed from office and definite instructions will be sent to all valls that they must repress all further acts of violence.

Furthermore it is stated that the ministry of instruction will estimate the cost of rebuilding the Catholic convents in Asia Minor, partially destroyed during the recent disturbances.

Aid will be given to the residents of those districts which are reported to have suffered severely during the recent trouble. The sultan has also promised to immediately issue a decree enforcing the reforms granted in 1865 to six vilayets of Armenia. In addition he has agreed to extend these reforms to other provinces.

M. Hanotaux thanked the Turkish envoy who explained the matter to him. It is now stated that the minister of foreign affairs has issued instructions to M. Cambon to carefully watch and see whether these promises made by the sultan are carried into execution.

Frightened Into Submission.
LONDON, Nov. 9.—Special dispatches to the morning papers from Constantinople all agree that the sultan has been much perturbed by the speech made by M. Hanotaux, the French minister of foreign affairs, and that it is on that account that he has granted concessions to M. Cambon, the French ambassador.

Free Coinage Campaign Will Proceed.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—The campaign for the free coinage of silver will be waged with vigor during the next four years, in preparation for the election in 1900. The directors of the American Bimetallite union, who constitute the bulk of the silver holders in three parties, have decided to maintain headquarters in this city, from which to send out literature. The branch office at Chicago will be consolidated with the Washington office, but the San Francisco branch is to be continued. At the request of the directors General A. J. Warner, president of the union, has issued an address to the silver leagues and bimetallic unions of the United States.

MR. WILLIAMS' MISSION.

Cuba's Ex-Consul General in the Spanish Capital. IN THE INTEREST OF PEACE.

His Personal Friends Believe That, While He Went Abroad Ostensibly for His Health, He is Really a Representative of Our Government.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The Morning Advertiser says today: It was reported in this city yesterday that the ex-consul general in Havana, Hannon O. Williams, might be expected here from Europe in about ten days. Although the fact of Mr. Williams' presence in Spain escaped the vigilance of the newspaper correspondents in the Spanish capital, it is nevertheless true that he has been in Madrid for three weeks past, and in the immediate circle of his family it was announced that he was to leave for New York by one of the North German liners on Saturday last.

While the fact cannot, for obvious reasons, be definitely learned, it is generally believed by his personal friends that Mr. Williams' visit to Madrid has been made as an agent of the United States, with the view of making some arrangement by which a peaceful solution of the Cuban question might be brought about. It will be remembered that on returning from Havana Mr. Williams spent some time in Washington, where he had several lengthy interviews with President Cleveland and Secretaries Olney and Herbert. He left then for Europe, sailing on Sept. 8, it being generally supposed that his trip was taken for rest and in the interest of his health.

Some close personal friends of the ex-consul general, however, make no secret of their belief that his mission to Spain was to sound the Spanish government and, in conjunction with Minister Taylor, to endeavor to procure a friendly settlement of the difficulties with Cuba. It was stated that Mr. Williams was authorized to favor negotiations by which the purchase of the islands by the Cubans might be arranged, on the understanding that the United States would guarantee the payments to the mother country.

Convict Killed by a Deputy.
BALTIMORE, Nov. 10.—Andrew Jackson, aged 30 years, a colored convict in the penitentiary, was shot and mortally wounded in the prison on Saturday by John B. Wollering, a deputy warden, whom he was about to attack with a shoe knife and hammer. The officer fired two shots. The first went wide of the mark, but the second struck the convict just under the heart. He fell without a word and died two hours later in the prison hospital. Jackson was sentenced Nov. 13, 1881, to serve three years for larceny. He was always sullen and had been punished during his incarceration no less than forty-three times for all sorts of offenses. The coroner's jury exonerated Wollering.

Mark Hanna Dines the Scribes.
NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Mark A. Hanna gave a dinner Saturday night to the newspaper men who had regularly "covered" national headquarters either in New York or Chicago during the campaign. The dinner was served in the banquet hall at the Waldorf, and it was an elaborate affair. The decorations were somewhat emblematic of the issues of the campaign, a little gold and silver ship being provided for each diner as a souvenir. There was also presented to each of the guests a gold medal, the size of a twenty dollar gold piece. There were a few short speeches, Mr. Hanna leading off with a complimentary address to the reporters.

Distinguished Array of Legal Talent.
CINCINNATI, Nov. 9.—Ex-President Harrison appears here today in the United States circuit court of appeals in the case of Charles Hamilton against the Toledo, Kansas City and St. Louis Railroad company and the Continental Trust company, of New York. Hon. Charles W. Fairbanks, of Indiana, appears in the same case against the ex-president. Judge John H. Doyle, of Toledo, also makes an argument in the case, as will Hon. Edward C. Henderson, of New York.
