### A VERY ENJOYABLE EVENING.

A Jr. O. E. A. M. Anniversary Successfully Celebrated With a Smoker.

Major Jennings Council No. 397, Jr. O. E. A. M., last evening celebrated its eighth anniversary by holding a smoker in which the members entertained some of their friends and vice versa with great success. The evening was one of the most enjoyable ever spent by the Council and it will undoubtedly have a beneficial effect upon the future of the organization, as well as the guests of the evening. The Council first held a brief business session in which matters requiring immediate attention were disposed of and for the succeeding two hours there was a flow of wholesome utterances, interspersed with delightful vocal and instrumental music that provoked frequent outbursts of enthusiastic applause. Fully two hundred members of the Council were in attendance and they listened with undivided attention to addresses made by Rev. Robert O'Boyle, pastor of the Trinity Reformed church, and Rev. Alfred Heesler, of the Methodist Episcopal church. Both are members of the order and could therefore speak intelligently on its aims, principles and work. Rev. O'Boyle made special reference to Christian citizenship and furnished much food for reflection. The sentiments expressed by Rev. Heesler fairly bubbled with patriotic enthusiasm and made an excellent impression. He placed much stress upon the qualifications, rights and duties of citizenship and declared that if the principles of the Jr. O. E. A. M. are faithfully carried out it can always stand in the front rank of American fraternal organizations. The balance of the program consisted of singing by the Council, David Brooks, Edward Cooper, W. E. Phillips, William Lamer and a glee club, and instrumental music by W. J. Brooks, followed by remarks of an amusing character by the comic, C. T. Stranglin, and the whole concluding with the singing of "God be With You Till We Meet Again" by the assembly. During the exercises Secretary William Reeves made an address on the Jr. O. E. A. M. Orphans' Home, which was followed by a collection for the home, that made a pleasing addition to the fund. Major Jennings Council is one of the strongest Councils of the Jr. O. E. A. M., having a membership of over four hundred.

### THE COURT CALENDAR.

Proceedings in the Civil and Criminal Courts Yesterday.

The two-week session of criminal court opened yesterday with Judges Pershing and Bechtel upon the bench, assisted by Judge Saridge. Some civil business was also transacted.

A charter was granted to the First Lithuanian Band of Shenandoah.

The application for a charter for the German Beneficial Association was not granted because of some defects in the papers.

John Broderick was appointed tax collector in East Union township.

Restraint was filed against the division of Upper Mahanoy township.

H. O. Bechtel presented the statement of the Supervisors of East Union township that Ed. Crumney, tax collector, who is \$700 in arrears. Judgment was asked against Crumney and his bondsmen.

The election officers of case township were before the court for neglecting to sign election returns. They were reprimanded and let go by paying costs.

The Lynd-Dunn contest court recommenced this afternoon. The question of admitting the ballots as evidence at this stage was the leading discussion.

The jury in the case of Adam Paulokonis, of town, charged with assault and battery and a. and b. with intent to kill, rendered a verdict of guilty in manner and form as indicted. This case was tried before Judge Bechtel. Sentenced to pay \$20 fine and one year's imprisonment in each case.

The constables are dissatisfied because they receive no pay for making returns.

A meeting of the Justices and Constables of the county was held yesterday afternoon in the Hoffman building, Pottsville. Justice Mellon, of Trouton, presided. Only routine business was transacted.

Three bills were found in the assault and battery cases of John Augustinus, charged by Frank McElusky, and Patrick Igo, on oath of Joseph Kohillas.

The bill in the larceny case of Michael Igo against Charles Younally was ignored.
