FREESHIP BILL SHOULD BE PASSED.

Mr. Chamberlain, the Commissioner of Navigation, Says the Control of Trans-Pacific Carrying Trade Is Gradually Stlpping Away from Us.

Washington, Nov. 16.—The report of the commissioner of navigation for 1896, after referring to the necessity for the pas-sage of a free ship bill, states that our maritime rank on the Pauffe is now threatened by a new rival, Japan, which under liberat and progressive laws, has just established a trans-Pacific steamship line to the United States, and, with the co-operation of American capital, is preparing to extend rapidly the service. For the control of this trade the United States enjoy obvious natural ad-vantages. Within the last five years Japan's sugging steel steamers have in-creased from thirteen of 27,701 tons to fifty-three of 106,383 tons. The number of American steel and iron steamers on the Pacific coast is forty-three of 68,025 tons.

The report recommends an immediate extension of the act of 1892 under which the steamships New York and Paris were admitted to American registry and the steamships St. Louis and St. Paul were built in the United States. Under existing law it is impossible to establish on the Pacific a mall service, even approximating our Atlantic mail service, on equal condi-tions with those found necessary to the re-cant creation of the latter. The report opposes at length the proposition to impose 10 per cent, additional discriminating du this on all cargoes brought into the United States by foreign vessels. It points out that for over eighty years the United States have followed the policy of recipro-city in shipping. Every other maritime nation of considerable rank has adopted and now mergins the same saller. and now pursues the same policy.

England's recognition of the Monroe dectrine will make it very difficult for any other power to refuse to recognize it. It is safe to say that the United States has undertaken responsibil-ities that may press upon them very heavily some day."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 .- In view of the fact that the letter of Tom Watson acceptthe Populist party has been published. Senator Marion Butler yesterday made public his reply, written when Mr. Watson's letter was received, in which he took exception to its tone. The reply is in substance as follows:

"You, in effect, advise Populists not to support the joint electoral tickets that have been arranged in a large number of states. Is it possible that you fully ap-preciate the effect of such advice? At least, upon reflection, you must know that if enough Populists should follow this advice it would mean the defeat of Bryan and the election of McKinley. Besides, if your advice should be followed by enough Populists the People's party would not have a single elector in the electoral collegs. In the states where we have joint electoral tickets we will get the bulk, if not all, of the People's party congressmen. In your own state and other states which have followed your advice against electoral tickets we will not get a single elector, and I fear not many congressmen, if any. "You certainly cannot mean, however
