MULDOON'S NEW HOTEL.
A Beauty in Architecture and Admirable in Appearances.
Muldoon's new hotel, the imposing structure built on the lines of colonial architecture at the northwest corner of Centre and West streets, has reached the stage of completion and to-morrow the proprietor, Mr. H. J. Muldoon, will celebrate the event by having a grand opening in the cafe, a magnificent place which has been fitted up regardless of cost. In outward appearance the hotel is the prettiest building in the town and in general appointments there is no hotel in the county that surpasses, and few equals it. Thousands of dollars have been spent in the alterations of the property that have been in progress for months past and it has been transformed into a veritable palace. There are twenty-five apartments in the building, each one large and well lighted and excellently adapted for the hotel business. On the second floor there is a spacious parlor and nine large bedrooms, and on the third floor ten elegant sleeping apartments. There is also on the second floor a bathroom with all modern improvements including a large porcelain lined bath tub furnished by E. F. Gallagher, who also superintended the plumbing for the building. Joseph Bell had the contract for the building and carried it out with excellent satisfaction to Mr. Muldoon and great credit to himself. P. W. Bell furnished the gas and electric light fixtures and hot water heating apparatus for the building. T. W. Conville the painting and John P. Cardin the paper hanging, all of which have contributed very materially to the beauty and completeness of the structure. The cafe is again. It is furnished in heavy, handomely carved oak bar fixtures with mammoth panels of heavy, beveled-edge plate glass and the surrounding fixtures partake of proportionate magnificence. Mr. Muldoon proposes to conduct the cafe on strictly metropolitan lines and will spare no pains or expense to keep it on that plane. The bar will be stocked with the very best brands of wines, liquors, ales, beers, porters and cigars, imported as well as domestic, and the famous Pechorr Bran beer will always be kept on tap. The formal opening of the cafe will take place to-morrow and the entire establishment will be thrown open in the near future.
