



### BIMETALLISM NEEDED.

#### Senator Chandler Declares That It Must Soon Come.

#### OPPOSED TO THE GOLD STANDARD

The Recent Election, Declares New Hampshire's Republican Senator, Proved That the Silver Question Is Not Dead—Forthrightly Favors International Bimetallism.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—The Post, in a cable letter from London, prints advance copy of an important article written by Hon. William E. Chandler, Senator from New Hampshire, for the December issue of The National Review, the conservative monthly, in which he discusses the late election from the Republican standpoint. His principal object is to encourage European bimetallists to continue their propaganda.

The Review, commenting editorially upon the election of Major McKinley, dogmatically asserts that "unless the Republican party settles the silver question before 1900 there will be nothing left of that party after 1900."

Senator Chandler's article is in part as follows:

"European bimetallists need not believe that the selection of McKinley and Hobart by overwhelming majorities is a decision to permanently accede to the single gold standard. The Bryan proposition was soon seen by the American voters to be simply that the United States should adopt silver monometallism; should deliberately give up all attempts to keep gold and silver at a parity; should send gold to a premium and thereby make it merchandise merely, and should base all American prices on silver only. It can hardly be considered upon reflection by any true bimetallist that such action on our part would have helped the cause of bimetallism in any country of the world.

"It is true that the Bryanites called themselves bimetallists, and that Mr. Bryan's political entomologist addressed not the Democrats, nor the Populists, nor the people, but the 'bimetallists.' This, however, is a sheer affectation. No Bryan orator or writer has seriously denied that the adoption of this policy—the immediate unlimited free coinage of silver by the United States—would send gold to a premium and keep it there for any definite period. Surely that would be silver monometallism, and can it be contended that silver monometallism is any better stepping stone to bimetallism than gold monometallism? I had supposed that it was generally agreed by thoughtful and rational bimetallists everywhere that it would not help, but rather hinder the cause of bimetallism for the United States to leap at once to free silver coinage.

"Conservative people—and America has more conservative than Europe—think we were alarmed at the character of the followers of Mr. Bryan, and at their doctrines additional to the one favoring free silver coinage. All the socialists, anarchists and wild men of society whom Europe has sent us worked for Bryan, although the great bulk of our adopted citizens voted for McKinley. The platform seemed to countenance rioting as a means of redress of grievances, and it made one of its planks a reconstruction of the supreme court in order to change a legal decision.

"A majority of the American people wish a more energetic foreign policy than they would believe would come from any administration named Democratic. They are deeply affected by the lamentable condition of the Christian subjects of the Turkish empire. They mean to annex Hawaii. They desire to see Venezuela allowed to retain her rightful sole dominion over the months of the Orinoco. They are intensely anxious to see arrested the atrocities in Cuba, and to aid in making the island free and independent.

"But none of the foregoing arguments influenced so many voters against Mr. Bryan as did the determination of the American people to plainly vindicate and firmly establish the principle of protection to American industries by adequate tariff duties on foreign products.

"That the United States is opposed to the single gold standard and is in favor of retreating in due course and with careful regard to the national honor the steps taken in the demonetization of silver until both gold and silver shall be admitted to free coinage at the ratio of 16 to 1, and made the standard money of the world, and the measure of values of the world—in a proposition which would resolve the surfrages of four-fifths of our voters, if this proposition alone could be fairly presented to them, even without further debate.

"To such convictions entertained by a vast majority of American voters committed to bimetallism, the friends of such a monetary system may confidently appeal. The question is not of four years, nor yet of a decade. It may take as long to reconvert silver as it has taken to realize the paralyzing influence of demonetization. But the fact that 6,000,000 out of 18,000,000 of American voters have given their ballots for the wild project of immediate free coinage of silver by the United States alone shows that the question is one which must be compromised and adjusted in some way.

"The advocates of gold monometallism are crying out that the silver question is dead. They hope, but do not really believe, that this is true. Never was it more important for bimetallists to exert themselves. Mr. McKinley is pledged by his own words to co-operation with us."

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### COLOMA'S EXECUTION.

#### The Insurgent Patriot Went to His Doom Cheering for Cuba.

#### THOUSANDS SAW THE KILLING.

Many Spaniards in the Crowd Showed a Disposition to Attack the Prisoner, but the Soldiers Kept Them Quiet—Maceo's Forces in a Deplorable Condition.

HAVANA, Nov. 30.—The execution of Lopez Coloma, who first raised the cry of revolt in the province of Matanzas, and who was sentenced to death by court martial for the crimes of the rebellion, homicide and horse theft, was witnessed by thousands of people.

After spending twenty-four hours in a chapel, in accordance with the Roman rite and the Spanish law, the condemned man was confessed by a priest, received the sacrament and heard mass, after which he passed the night in an excited frame of mind. He rose in the morning broken in spirit and terrorized. Had he been executed that morning it would have been impossible for him to keep up. He spent the day in a condition of repose and in the evening appeared to be refreshed and of a firmer spirit as he was led to his doom. An American artist, acting for Harper's Weekly, attempted to take a snap shot of the scene with a photographic camera, but he was politely expelled from the ground by order of Governor Garrich.

When finally the prisoner left the chapel he was accompanied by the priest, and in passing in front of Sangulley's cell he cried: "My general, viva Cuba libre!"

The priest reproved the prisoner, but later on descending to the site of the execution, he again uttered cries for free Cuba. The priest placed his hands upon the prisoner, and cautioned him to remember that he had received the sacrament. Coloma answered by saying: "You are right, father, but I cannot help it."

Arrived at the site of execution, and while the prisoner was being prepared to be shot, he again cried: "Viva Cuba libre!" The commander of the military forces present cried in reply, "Viva Espana!" and the crowds took up the cry in chorus, drowning the subversive cries of the prisoner. The execution followed.

The public showed great excitement, and the presence of the government forces was all that kept them quiet. Several Spaniards showed a disposition to manifest their patriotism by attacking the prisoner.

The intendante has dictated rules to the custom house employees designed to prevent the exportation of any kind of leaf tobacco from any part in the provinces of Matanzas, Santa Clara, Puerto Principe and Santiago de Cuba.

The prominent members of Pinar del Rio affirm that Antonio Maceo's situation is desperate. His forces, they say, are half naked, and are compelled to wander continually without rest. They are badly nourished, and many of the whites in his command have consumption. Maceo's equipments are said to be like hospitals. Many of the negroes, it is said, are pale and thin, and fever, dysentery and small-pox are causing great mortality. Maceo's men are reported to be in a condition of great fatigue and their enthusiasm is dying out, the prospect of General Weyler's invasion causing dismay as to the adhesion of the inhabitants to the cause. The chiefs murmur, and the hopes of victory are turned into the certainty of the complete destruction of forces. These murmurs add that General Weyler is expected to lead a mortal blow to the revolution in Pinar del Rio by the end of the year.

Several well known insurgent leaders have dynamited a military train running along the trocha from Juacaro to Moron, in the western portion of Puerto Principe. Several cars were smashed, and the insurgents then attacked an iron plated car, in which was the train's escort of twenty-five men and officers, including a captain and the chief official of the railway. An armored engine set out in pursuit of the column. Colonel Arminan arriving upon the scene, the insurgents retreated, leaving eight killed and carrying off their injured.
