THREE FRIENDS SAFE.

The Filibuster Has Probably Landed Her Cargo in Cuba.

SPANIARDS DROWNING PRISONERS

A Cuban Just Arrived from the Insurgent Lines Declares That the Victims Are Fed to Sharks-Reports of Insurgent Victories from Insurgent Sources.

TAMPA, Fla., Doc. 19 -Roberto Solar, Maria, Pia., 190c., 190-Roberto Sona, who spent seventeen months in the insurgent camp of Colonel Raoul Arango, in the prevince of Havana and Matanzas, arrived on the steamalip Oliveite last night. Mr. Solar in an interview said:

"I wasteld before leaving Havana that the last expedition of the Three Friends had been successfully landed on Tuesday night. I believe the roport to be true, as official circles in Havana were greatly

sgitated that night. agitated that night.

"There is no longer any doubt that Maceo is dead. I saw a letter which should now be in the hands of the junta at New York from Brigadler Adolfo Castillo, who is fighting in Havana province, stating positively that laceo had been killed by Spanish treachery. He did not give any particulars, saying that he would forward them in a few days, or as soon as he was satisfied that he had obtained the he was satisfied that he had obtained the true story. I also saw the accredited agent in Havana, and he told me that Macco was dead, but that his death was sur-rounded with mystery. I cannot doubt this proof.

"The conditions in Cuba are such that the Spaniards have dominion only over that part of the island on which they stand. This is principally in the city. The entire country is in possession of the in-surgents, even that immediately surround-ing Havana. The talk of the insurgents being starved out is ridiculous. The world may not believe it, but the Spanish au-thorities are drowning some of their pris-oners at Playa del Chivo, near Havana. Those whom they drown they declare belong to a secret negro society called Nan-igos, but as a fact they class any one as Nanigos if they wish to drown them. The victims are taken out in boats, their hands tied up to their necks and a weight fast-ened to them, so that when they are thrown overboard they plunge head downward into the water, which is alive with sharks."

REPORTED INSURGENT VICTORIES. Weyler Keeping All the Troops He Can in Hayana.

KEY WEST, Fla., Dec. 19.-Reports from Havana state that the Spanish soldiers in the Pinar del Rio section are deserting quite rapidly, that sickness on the trocha and descritons have made reinforcement necessary there. Weyler is keeping all the troops he can in Havana. The news from Matanzas province is disquieting.

The palace officials refuse information as to the results of the engagements at Toco and Purgatono this week. It is known that the Spanish lost many men and much provisions, arms and ammunition. At Neavaraz in these engagements a large detachment of insurgents gathered Tuesday and the Spaniards under
