To Avenge Massacred Britons.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—The Daily News announces that Lord Salisbury has consented to a punitive attack upon the King of Benin. In the Niger coast, protectionists, on account of the massacre of a British expedition in which were included Acting Consul General Phillips and other British officials. The attack will, however, be delayed about a month, until the arrival of fresh troops from England. The expedition will comprise nearly a thousand men and will be a determined expedition to avenge the massacred Europeans. Five men of war will anchor off New Benin during the operations.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—Michael Castello, central for murder, was last night found guilty of manslaughter in the first degree. On July 23 last Castello shot and killed James Purcell, formerly his dearest friend, whom Castello accused of seducing his wife.

A Maniac's Horrific Crime.

WHEELING, W. Va., Jan. 15.—James Burrows, an attendant in the insane hospital here, was arraigned Wednesday night by Will Taylor, a jurist. The weapon used was an iron bar, with which the madman beat his victim's head to a pulp. Several employees gathered in time to witness the terrifying spectacle of the frenzied man laboring deliberately to bring his victim's blood. He was overpowered and placed in a padded cell.

Asphyxiated in a Harlem Hotel.

New York, Jan. 15.—William Ferguson and James McKenna were found dead in a room of a Harlem hotel yesterday. The man occupied the room together. They had been asphyxiated by illuminating gas. Ferguson and McKenna were prominent members of the Typographical Union No. 6. Ferguson was the secretary and treasurer of No. 6 and McKenna was at one time vice president of the international union.

Hunting Assassins with Bloodhounds.

MADEIRA, Jan. 15.—About a o'clock in the morning a party of hooded men went to the home of William Rowland, a merchant at Adams station, twenty-two miles below Madeira, and demanded his money. He refused and attempted to fend himself with a gun. Being overpowered and Mrs. Rowland was shot. It is understood that she has since died. A posse is now in pursuit of the assassins with bloodhounds.

The Arrest of General Roloff.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The arrest of General Carlos Roloff, secretary of war of the Cuban republic, reported in these columns yesterday, was on a warrant sworn out by the Spanish consul, in which the general is charged with violation of the neutrality laws in connection with an alleged filibustering expedition to Cuba on the steamer Woodall on June 25, 1895. Yesterday he was released on \$2,500 bail.
