BAD FOR EISENHOWER.

Action of the Supreme Court Indicates Confirmation.

Theodore Eisenhower, who is in the county jail under sentence of death for the killing of John Schwindt in this town on February 17th, 1896, is apparently a doomed man and his only hope appears to lie in an appeal to the Board of Pardons.

Although the Supreme Court has not rendered its decision on Eisenhower's appeal from the decision of Judge Sawdige refusing to grant a new trial, there is every reason to believe that it will do so. This belief is based upon the action of Chief Justice Sterrett, of the Supreme Court, when the case was up for argument on Monday.

CRIMINAL COURT.

Some Shenandoah Cases Tried and Disposed of Yesterday.

Anthony Balans, who was arrested in this town on a charge of stealing \$60 from a fellow boarder at Mahanoy Place, received a sentence of \$5 fine, costs, and six months imprisonment.
