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THE COST OF MINING COAL

Coal colliers, and the colliery worked 104 days in 1906, and since January 1st about 15 or 16 days a month. He had seen no bearings and knew of no destruction at that place.

THE INVESTIGATION.

Shenandoah, Pa., April 20.—Two sessions, morning and afternoon, were held yesterday by the Anthracite Investigating committee.

Among the witnesses examining were Miles M. Decker, coal labor leader; Thomas M. Decker, coal operator at Mt. Carmel; Poor Director James Haller, of Mt. Carmel; Wm. Brittle, of Mahanoy City, and Daniel F. Gallagher, another well known labor man.

Mr. Decker testified to the fact that there were a number of companies in this vicinity which are violating the mine law.

He named the Saffair, Excelsior, Patterson, Royal Oak and Collier as among them. These violate the semi-monthly pay law.

At the Excelsior a provision in the mine ventilation and relating to timber is violated. The miners are compelled to prepare the timber at their own expense.

The witness had notified the mine superintendent of this violation and had requested him to remedy the evil, to which he gave no heed.

In this regard, the witness said, owing to a fear of discharge, should they be landed together.

Mr. Decker gave some points about the methods of work and wages of the miners. He said the miners and laborers are employed from 35 to 40 hours only each week.

The miners are paid 90 cents per car for cutting the coal. The company loads the coal upon the cars from the breasts free of charge to the miners.

Laborers inside are paid \$1.20 per week. Five dollars per month is charged each week.

His company runs a store at Mahanoy City. The prices charged for goods at the company store are not higher than those asked for at individual stores.

There is no preference shown to workmen on account of nationality. Outside laborers are paid from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per day pending on the character of the work.

In reply to a question about the coal combination Mr. Decker gave it as his belief that the dissolution of this combination would make matters much worse than they are at present.

He said that it cost more to put coal on the cars when the collieries are working short time than when full time is being made.

Mr. Decker testified that he is employed as a miner at the Pennsylvania colliery and is paid 75 cents per wagon for coal mined.

The average is five wagons per day. Since January last work has been much slack.

He has been earning about \$20 per month; not enough to keep his family; much destitution in Mt. Carmel.

Mr. Decker said that preference was given to Polish and Slavonian laborers over other nationalities and native citizens.

These favored ones must employ their own countrymen, to whom they pay from \$4 to \$5 per week.

Mr. Gallagher testified that he is employed as a miner at the Pennsylvania colliery and that he receives 90 cents per car for the coal he mines.

He said there was much destitution and for the first time in his history Mt. Carmel has found it necessary to appoint a relief committee.

In regard to the causes of destitution he gave as his opinion that there is too much land in the hands of the few and too many workmen.

He also expressed his opinion that pauper labor enters into competition with other labor, thereby crowding out the latter.

He testified that prices of goods are higher at company stores than at individual stores. He also testified that foreigners are preferred at the works.

He charged that the law relating to the examination of applicants for miners' certificates are violated in that certificates are issued to applicants after but four months' service in the mines instead of two years as required by law.

He recommended that restriction of immigration as a cure for the present ills. During the past 20 years there has been a marked reduction in the price of contract work at the mines.

He estimated the reduction is fully 50 per cent. Mr. Brittle, of Mahanoy City, was next witness called.

He was formerly a miner, but for the past few years has been engaged in the sale of groceries on the road. He testified that his sales have fallen off fully 50 per cent. this year as compared with 1905 for the same period of time.

He testified that the fact to the depressed condition in the coal region. The business men are very much discouraged. He spoke of the coal combination as a monopoly. Coal has been advanced in price \$1 per ton in 1906 in New York.

The coal witness thought, were entirely too high. The new coal combine, the witness thought, has made matters much worse than heretofore.

Mr. Brittle testified that the foreman at the Natalie colliery had informed him that it cost his company \$1.05 per ton to put the coal up on the cars.

The committee concluded their labors here without ascertaining anything new, or the suggestion of a remedy for the depression that exists in the coal regions.
