**A MUSICAL TREAT.**

**Street Paving Contracts.**

A special meeting of the Town Council of Mahanoy City was held last night for the purpose of opening bids and awarding the contract for paving eight squares in that town. Twelve bids were received, but after reading the same it was decided to take the five lowest bids for further consideration. The five lowest bids were as follows: The Philadelphia & Reading Coal & Iron Co., \$1,300; J. J. Price, \$1,300; and Durham & Co., Plainfield, N. J. The other two could not be ascertained. **FOR BETTER CITIZENSHIP**

An Interesting and Instructive Lecture by Dr. Strong.

MEANS FOR PURIFYING POLITICS!

Many of the People Who Plead to the United States Come With Good Intentions, But Lack the Required Knowledge—The Only Remedy.

There was a large gathering in the Presbyterian church last evening to listen to the lecture of Dr. Joseph Strong, of New York, the general secretary of the Evangelical Alliance of the United States of America. The lecture was pronounced one of the most instructive and interesting delivered in this town for many years and will undoubtedly have a good effect among those who were fortunate enough to hear it. Dr. Strong is an able and fluent speaker and presents his views with such clearness of force that he cannot fail to attract serious consideration to the noble work in which he is engaged in behalf of the Alliance.

The speaker commenced his lecture with a description of the growth of cities in the United States during the last century and pointed out the causes of the growth. In the first place, he said, it was due to the facilities for feeding the multitudes of people; secondly, the desire of man to associate; thirdly, the building of factories in the cities; fourthly, the amount of machinery used in farming has taken labor away from the farms and thrown it into the cities. Dr. Strong then spoke of the dangers of city life. Vice is on the increase in the cities, so much so in such places as New York that it is noted all over the world. Much of this is due to the fact that the cities are not allowed to govern themselves. Local legislation is too much restricted by state control and a certain amount of freedom is thus taken away from the cities which would, under other circumstances, be in a better position to enact laws which might better suppress vice. He cited as an instance that people at Harrisburg frequently have more control over affairs in Philadelphia than the citizens of that latter place. This promotes boss rule and the only remedy is to educate men in the knowledge of their rights and duties as citizens.
