MAHANAY CITY.

The funeral of Mrs. Annie, wife of Jacob Watkins, took place from the family residence on East Centre street, this afternoon, and was largely attended. The orders of the P. O. of T. A. and Daughters of Rebecca attended the funeral.

The fact that John Corser and Allen Cruise, of Allentown, will be present at the bicycle meet next Friday is sufficient to guarantee success. Corser holds the state one-half mile championship and Cruise the two mile record.

Bryan O'Neil was admitted to the Milner's hospital to-day. He is suffering from a large swelling on the index finger of the right hand due to a cut received three weeks ago. The swelling is caused by sulphur water and also the formation of an abscess.

The Mahanoy City Fireman's Relief Association held a meeting last evening and elected the following officers for the coming year: Thomas Barker, president; William Bradbury, vice president; Dr. H. R. Brecker, secretary; William Kelly, treasurer; and Daniel Becker, Leonard Roth, James Collins and Hamer T. Boer, directors.

Contractor Koble, with a large force of men, is erecting two more tubular boilers at the Boston Iron colliery.

Conrad Bollinger, carpenter on a P. & R. gang, received painful injuries this morning by being caught under a heavy piece of timber.

Tamaqua's Water Supply.

Tamaqua Town Council is considering the subject of an increased water supply, and at a special meeting a lengthy report was received from H. P. Basset, giving his estimate of the cost of laying the new water mains, etc. He stated that it would be necessary to buy several acres of land around the reservoir in order to keep the water in

good condition, also that by using the Rabbit Run water for engines and motive power, and the Owl Creek water for family purposes, there would be enough water to supply twenty thousand inhabitants, providing the breast of the dam be raised and the water shed improved. He also gave the number of feet required and the different sizes of pipe needed, giving the total cost for the completed work at \$60,000.

Council last discussed the report and finally decided to hold an election on July 20, at which the people can decide whether \$50,000 shall be borrowed to improve the system.

Railroaders' Memorial Day.

Railroaders' Memorial Day will be celebrated at Tamaqua, on Sunday, June 14th. The orders of Locomotive Engineers, Locomotive Firemen, Railroad Conductors, Railroad Trainmen and Railroad Telegraphers, better known as the Group of Five, with headquarters at Mahanoy, will have charge of the celebration. A special train will arrive from Mahanoy at 9 a. m., when a line of parade will be formed at the P. & R. station and will proceed up Broad street to the 'Edwards' cemetery, where the graves of their dead brothers will be decorated and a memorial sermon will be delivered by Rev. Mills, of the M. E. church. After the services a special train will convey the Group of Five to Mahanoy, where similar services will be held.

OUR EXPORTS.

Washington, June 25.—The monthly statement of the principal articles of domestic exports shows exports during May, 1897, as compared with May, 1896, as follows: Dried stuffs, \$13,087,612; increase, \$2,699,178; Cotton, \$9,621,472; increase, \$2,440,869; Mineral oils, \$5,362,282; decrease, \$487,297; Cattle and horses, \$3,479,621; increase, \$168,252; Provisions, \$16,592,182; increase, \$844,247.

A Game Bill Vetted.

Governor Hastings vetoed the bill to prevent the killing of grouse, pheasant, quail, partridge, woodcock, wild pigeon, trout or bass, and to prohibit absolutely the killing of deer or fawn for three years. The Governor says that the bill conflicts with the constitutional provision providing that the general assembly shall not pass any local or special laws regulating the affairs of counties, cities, townships, wards, boroughs or school districts. Another reason given for the veto is that the new game law fully covers the objects of the special act.
