McKINLEY AT NASHVILLE.

The President's Speech at the Tennessee Exposition.

APPLAUDS TENNESSEE LOYALTY.

A Graceful Tribute to the State That Gave Jackson to the Nation—Mrs. McKinley's Enthusiastic Reception As She Entered the Auditorium.

Nashville, June 12.—President McKinley and party were escorted to the Tennessee exposition yesterday by a monster procession, a detachment of ex-Confederate veterans acting as guard of honor to the president.

Entering the exposition gates the party proceeded to the Auditorium, under the escort of the Centennial Guards.

Mr. McKinley, with the president and party were Governors Taylor and Bushnell and their staffs.

The speechmaking was opened by Hon. John W. Thomas, president of the exposition.
