**No More Gambling in Leadville.**  
 Leadville, Colo., June 29.—Public gambling has probably received its death blow here. Acting under an order from Judge Owens of the district court, a posse of deputy sheriffs raided every gambling establishment in the city, and seized over \$1,000 worth of tables and implements, which will be destroyed. All the proprietors of the gambling houses were arrested. The raid has caused a great sensation, as it breaks up an industry that has flourished here since 1879.

**MAHANAOY CITY.**

**A Jury Renders an Open Verdict in a Murder Case.**  
 MAHANAOY CITY, June 29.—The coroner's jury impeached some time ago to inquire into the cause of the death of Anthony Koslowski, whose body was found in a well in New Boston on the morning of May 11th, rendered the following verdict: "That the deceased came to his death from injuries inflicted by persons unknown to this jury."

John Eisman, a miner injured at the Mahanoy colliery yesterday by the caving in of a heading, died at the miners' hospital this morning. He was 49 years of age, married, and a member of the St. Fidelis German Catholic Society of town.

Miss Mary A. Morgan, of Buck Mountain, sustained a fracture of the right leg and painful bruises about the face and body by falling from a pole yesterday.

At a meeting of the School Board last evening it was decided to make a tax levy of five mills for school and library purposes and two mills for bonded indebtedness. This with the state appropriation, will give a revenue of \$30,835.

Mrs. William Yanketel was arraigned before Justice Keiser, charged with attempting to kill John Hurdly.  Harrisburg, June 29.—A meeting of the committee to investigate the \$50,000 insurance scandal was held last night, at which an affidavit of Frank H. **Eastern Penitentiary Praised.**  
 Harrisburg, June 29.—The report of the legislative penitentiary committee appointed to investigate prison management was presented last night. Of the Eastern penitentiary the report declares that "the cleaner of better kept public building can be found in this commonwealth.
