**THE ALIEN LAW.**

It is Enforced at All the P. & R. C. & I.  
Company's Collieries.

The new alien tax law went into effect yesterday and the P. & R. C. & I. Co. has already enforced it. The law taxes all unnaturalized foreigners in employ of corporations three cents per day, which sum must be deducted from their wages. On Wednesday the P. & R. C. & I. Co. issued notices in this district ordering every foreigner to bring his naturalization papers with him to work yesterday. Those who are in possession of such papers are highly elated and there is no doubt but that they will readily accede to the demand. The trouble, which it was feared would result in several using the same papers, will be obviated in having a day set for everyone to present their proof of naturalization. The idea of straightening the matter out at the beginning and not allowing it to proceed until the pay roll is completed, is a good one and one that should be followed by every other corporation, thus saving trouble at that time and preventing the carrying out of schemes to evade paying this tax. Failure to comply with the order permits of no reasonable excuse, as the matter has been made perfectly clear. The only hope for reaping the full benefit of this law lies with the various county judges, who in their naturalizing process should maintain a strict examination, highly necessary in this case, as the applicants will be many who would evade the tax.

A notice has also been served on each foreman of the Railway company that he should at once discharge all foreigners employed; in order to save the trouble that will arise from enforcing the new law. This action of the company is all its own and the action is nearer to what was desired by the framers of the new law, and we reap the benefit. While none to our knowledge is employed in the transportation department, yet hundreds find employment in the repair gangs. Although effected through the instrumentality of a law, yet the company showed a proper spirit in putting a construction upon the law that virtually means the ousting of every unaturalized foreigner from their employ.

**Russ' vs. Embassadors Captured.**

New York, July 2.—Some thirty arry Judko Kaplan, a clerk employed in the Bank of Kiev, Russia, decamped with 20,000 rubles, and about the same time Gustav P. Verpi, a postal official at St. Petersburg, absconded with 7,000 rubles. Recently the fugitives were traced to this country, and detectives were engaged by the Russian consul to hunt for them. On Wednesday Kaplan was captured in Philadelphia. Verpi was located at Hancock, Mich., and from there traced to Ashland, O. From the latter place the embassador was followed to Port Washington, L. I., where he was arrested yesterday. The prisoners were brought to this city and held for examination on extradition proceedings.
