ALIEN TAX MUDDLE.

How it Affects Shenandoah—The State school Appropriation Reduced. From the Miners' Journal. M. J. Fennell, who was tax collector of Shenandoah for three years ending 1906 was at the Commissioners' office yesterday. His errand was a peculiar one, in fact one that presents an unpleasant condition to Shenandoah in all its phases. Mr. Scamlin stated that there are in Shenandoah 4,000 foreigners of the Polish-Hungarian-Lithuanian type assessed and on the duplicate. Of this number only 700 are naturalized. Under the new alien tax law all the rest must pay three cents a day and they cannot be assessed for borough or school or other purposes. Mr. Scamlin therefore wanted to have these men exempted. Now, here is where Shenandoah comes in for the worst end of it. If the men are exempted the town will be out a big sum of money in the way of taxes. The school district, however, will be the greatest sufferer for not only will the amount of the school district duplicate be reduced to the extent of the taxes on 3,300 people, but its state appropriation will also be cut down quite a big sum. The school law governing the distribution of the appropriation is based on the number of taxables in a district. With over 3,000 taxables off the registry lists it is easily seen that Shenandoah will lose a large portion of its state appropriation. The loss will be keenly felt, as Shenandoah has 90 teachers and a large and expensive district.
