WRECK ON CENTRAL PACIFIC.

Six Indians Killed on the Blind Boggs. Reno, Nev., July 28.—One of the worst accidents in the history of the Central Pacific railroad occurred yesterday on Twenty-fifth Mile hill about six miles west of Reno. The engine was overturned and thrown to one side of the track and the tender on the other, and the road is littered with the debris of baggage, express and mail cars. Six Indians were killed, and nearly all the remainder were more or less injured.

The mail clerk, George W. O'Brien and D. A. Ross, escaped with a few cuts about the head and bruised about the body. The Fargo Express Messenger, J. H. Hark, was badly shaken up and bruised.

The wreck was caused, probably, by spreading of the rails. The mail and express car was turned bottom side up, the day coach and one sleeper were thrown at right angles to the track.

Three Drowned by a Capsizing Boat. Richmond, Va., July 28.—At Griggs Mill, four miles from Jarrett Station, yesterday afternoon Mr. J. C. Martin, formerly of Philadelphia, and George C. Smith and son, aged 10, were drowned while fishing in a pond. Mr. Smith was from Petersburg. The sad accident was due to the boat capsizing while Mr. Martin was endeavoring to free it from a snag.

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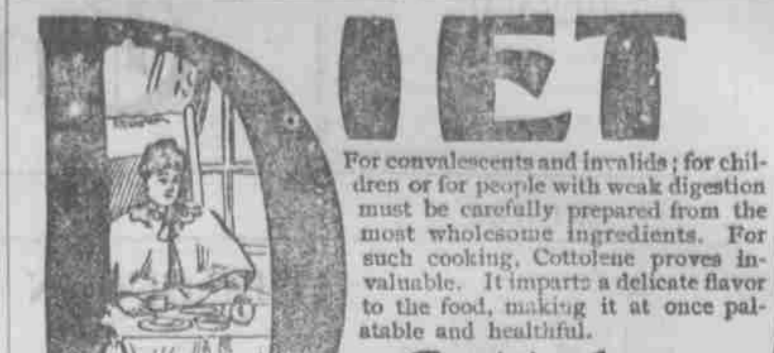
