Co. to put safety gates at the street crossings in that town, and will likely get them. **Wilkesbarre** is to have an additional clerk in the post office and a superintendent of mails at a salary of \$1800 per annum. **The twentieth annual reunion of the Pennsylvania and Maryland Union Medical Association** will be held to-morrow at York. **Miss Jennie Brown**, of Centonia, took the white veil at the convent of the Immaculate Heart, at West Chester, to-day. **Crackmen** despoiled the post office safe at Harford, Susquehanna County, and secured as booty \$40 in cash and a quantity of stamps. **Machony Plane** was disabled by the breaking of a piece of machinery in the hoisting engine last night but is running all right again to-day. **Falling from a Pennsylvania Railroad freight train** near Harrisburg, Francis Drow, of Helena, Mo., received injuries from which he soon died. **Coasting down a hill** at Stroudsburg, Miss Florence Conway, of Philadelphia, was thrown from her wheel and sustained severe internal injuries. **About \$800** it is said, has been realized from the sale of stamper privileges for the (Greensburg) fair this week.
