GOLDEN FOR COMMANDER.

A Pennsylvanian to Lead the Grand Army Veterans.

CHOSEN ON THE SECOND BALLOT.

Before the Taking of the Ballot was Concluded. However, the Election Was Made Unanimous—Cincinnati Gets the Next Encampment.

Buffalo, Aug. 27.—Cincinnati's triumph in securing the national encampment for 1898 and Pennsylvania's victory in winning the commander-in-chief of the Grand Army were the features of the encampment. Both battles were hard fought. The struggle was precipitated immediately after the executive session was called to order. The selection of the next place of meeting was first taken up, and the rival cities were given a hearing.

The citizen's committee of Cincinnati was admitted, consisting of W. B. Melish, chairman of the Convention League; M. E. Ingalls, president of the Big Four railroad; Gustav Tafel, mayor of Cincinnati; J. M. Blair, president of the Chamber of Commerce; Michael Ryan, assistant United States treasurer, and Congressman J. H. Brown.

President Ingalls presented the claims and attractions of the city in a happy speech, and the committee retired. Delegate Woodruff, of California, presented the claims of San Francisco. On the first ballot Cincinnati received 226 votes and San Francisco 214. The vote had not been announced when Mr. Woodruff withdrew from the contest and asked that the selection of Cincinnati be made unanimous. This was agreed to by acclamation.

Following the selection of Cincinnati Archbishop Ireland was called to the stage and made a glowing patriotic speech. He was followed by General Lew Wallace, who made a short address. The report of the committee on instruction followed this address. It criticized the books on war history used in the schools in the south as inaccurate, and suggested some changes, particularly in those used in church schools.

Nominations for commander-in-chief were then declared in order, and Isaac F. Mack, of Sandusky, O., was nominated by Delegate Brown, of Ohio; J. P. S. Gobin, of Lebanon, was nominated by Delegate Stewart, of Pennsylvania; George H. Innis, of Boston, by Delegate Wetherbee, of Massachusetts, and John G. Linehan, of New Hampshire, by Delegate Cogswell, of New Hampshire. Mr. Wetherbee later withdrew the name of Mr. Innis.

The first ballot resulted: Mack, 253; Linehan, 181; Gobin, 206. The vote of the second ballot was never announced officially, but as cast it stood: Gobin, 258; Mack, 242; Linehan, 123. Before the result could be announced by the tellers the 16 Missouri votes that had been cast for Mack were withdrawn and ordered changed to Gobin, who had received the other 12 of the votes belonging to the state. This gave Gobin 368 votes and enough to elect. Illinois and other states began to order their votes changed, but while this was in progress R. B. Brown, of Ohio, who nominated Mr. Mack, asked unanimous consent that the adjutant general be instructed to cast the vote of the encampment for Mr. Gobin, making his election unanimous. The encampment then adjourned until 9 o'clock this morning.

Post No. 123, of Philadelphia, gave Commander-in-Chief Elliott Gobin a rousing reception at the Hotel Troquois last night. There were a big assemblage of Pennsylvania veterans, and much enthusiasm. Colonel Gobin spoke briefly, thanking the members of his old post for their good wishes.

The department of New York G.A.R. gave a reception last night to Governor Black at the Hotel Troquois in the Elliott Square building, at which a thousand people were present. Some of the reunions yesterday were pathetic, as showing the thinning of the ranks. Of the New York Independent battery only eight members, including one officer, are living. Only a few comrades of the One Hundred and Sixth New York Infantry met, and they separated after the exchange of a few pleasantries. Two survivors of the Anderson Zouaves reported at the meeting place.

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WIVES AND DAUGHTERS OF STRIKERS.

Ridicule the Workers. PRESIDENT DOLAN RELEASED. Assured That He Had Not Violated the Injunction by Leading an Orderly Parade—Colonel Rend Declares the Strikers Will Certainly Lose.

Pittsburg, Aug. 27.—The wives and daughters of the striking miners at DeArmitt's Oak Hill mines, near Turley Creek took a prominent part yesterday in the demonstration against the working miners. A dozen or more women gathered at the camp, and with flags and banners marched along the roads leading toward the tipple. On their way they met a number of miners going to the tipple, and they greeted them with yells and jeers. They derided the miners who were working, and ridiculed them in a manner which caused many of them to hang their heads in shame. The women say they will make a demonstration every day hereafter.

The strikers claim that only 15 men were at work in the Oak Hill mines yesterday, and that the output Wednesday was only 35 pit cars, while the company officials say that 65 pit cars were mined.

Superintendent S. C. DeArmitt and four deputy sheriffs commenced the work of evicting the families of the striking miners yesterday. The work will be kept up until the company has possession of all its houses.

At Hunola the mine owners are gradually gaining on the strikers. Fourteen men returned to work Wednesday and 27 yesterday.

W. J. Crumman, attorney for the miners, is preparing his answer to the bill of the New York and Cleveland Gas Coal company in the proceedings against the miners' officials and strike leaders for contempt of court. The answer will declare that the camp and marching is not for the purpose of intimidation or menace to any one, but merely to indicate to the public in the mines that the miners generally are on a strike, and to demonstrate their strength by a show of numbers.

Gus Daitze, who is in charge of the sheriff's deputies at Plum Creek, was told yesterday by the sheriff's attorneys that under the injunction he could not interfere with the miners and parade with a band at their head. The only ones he can stop are those who are intimidating workmen.

President Dolan addressed a big meeting at Clare Ridge, Westmoreland county, last night. Before leaving the city he gave the details of his arrest Wednesday at McGovern. He went before Judge McIlvain and was told that he had not violated the provisions of the injunctions, and was discharged.

Colonel W. P. Rend, the Chicago operator who created something of a scene during the recent conference of miners and operators by making serious charges against President Ratchford, returned from Buffalo yesterday. When told that his charges had created considerable excitement, and that intimations had been thrown out that a trial might be entered against him, Colonel Rend said: "Let him sue me. I am ready to prove what I have charged, and I think it would be a good thing for the country if it were proved. That St. Louis convention could not set itself a better job than to investigate this matter. I made Dolan an offer to present Ratchford with the evidence, but it was not accepted."

Speaking of the strike generally Colonel Rend declared that it is now certain that the miners will lose it. He anticipates that within the next few days new men will be brought in to start some of the mines, but even if this is not done and the miners remain idle the men will get so much another golden opportunity as they have rejected. He says their great mistake was in supposing the operators were ready to give in because they sought arbitration. He declares that all the large lake shippers are firmly determined to resist the demands of the miners. If the miners had accepted the first propositions made by the operators at the conference on Friday they would have made a substantial gain, and would have improved permanently their condition.

Enough wheat came on the market to break the price to 99 1/2, but by the time the closing bell sounded, but brokers who are engineering the deals stoutly denied that it came from them.

Arrested on a Murder Charge. Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 27.—John D. Edmunds, of Kansas City, was arrested on a suspicion of complicity in the murder of the late John W. Peck, 310 E. 10th St. by Herbert H. Kay, of Waver, Neb. Edmunds gained a great deal of notoriety during the pendency of the famous insurance case of Dr. G. W. Fraker, the Excelsior Springs physician, who mysteriously disappeared after securing \$50,000 worth of life insurance policy from Edmunds. Fraker's office boy, J. H. Missouri, and swore on the stand that he had seen the physician drown. When Fraker was later found hiding in the Minnesota woods and brought back for trial Edmunds disappeared. He is now in Colorado Springs recently again on the office of Dr. Fraker. The doctor has given the Colorado officials damaging evidence tending to show that he formerly stoutly defended him. Edmunds asserts his innocence.
