All vessels touching at St. Michael's this summer have had great difficulty in keeping their crews, who have caught the gold fever very soon after arriving. One schooner, from Victoria, was entirely deserted, and her crew, from captain to cook, started up the river for Kiondike. The crew of the schooner J. M. Colman endeavored to descri also, but the attempt was dis-covered in time, and by a display of firearms the men were compelled to remain on duty. The Portland lost several of her crew, but was able to obtain new men by paying high wages.
