DEADLY NATURAL GAS.

It Kills Six Men and Fatally Injures

Nine Others.
Indianapolis, Sept. 4.—Six men were killed and nine probably fatally injured Saturday at Broad Ripple, a suburb six miles north, by two explosions of natural gas. Four buildings occupying a block of the town are in ruins. The dead are: Pius Gresh. aged 18 years, burned to death; Jacob Darling, painter, crushed by falling walls; Charles Yountze, single, 25 years, crushed to grocery ruins; \*.enty Ernst, an old soldier, and cook for Joseph Wambaugh; John Porter, farmer; Albert Hayworth, huckster.
