AT SKAGGUAY, WAITING FOR TRANSPORTATION.

Hundreds of fortune hunters are stalled at Skagguay awaiting means to transport their outfits over the pass to the Yukon. After the goods are landed from the steamer wagons haul a mile or two for \$5 a load. Then comes a ferry to cross a swift stream, for which \$1 for horses or men and 50 cents a package for baggage and freight are charged. Then come pack mules for four or five miles, with the tariff accordingly, then native Indians for a few miles more, then more ferries to the landing at the foothills, where the hard work of crossing the mountains begins.

### THE TEXAS STORM.

Ten Deaths in the Sabine Pass, and Many Are Missing.

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 15.—A special to The Star says: Sabine Pass suffered gravely from the storm. All of the small shipping at both the rivers and the old town was destroyed. The old tower was wrecked and many of the larger vessels badly damaged. Only the large buildings in the new town remain standing. During the storm six feet of water covered the town.

Ten deaths have been reported up to this time, and many are missing. Four tugs went down with their crews, but the United States life saving crew stationed at the pass succeeded in saving many lives.

When the terrible wind storm struck the town it was accompanied by a brisk rain, which soon made rivers of the streets. This, together with the high waves breaking over the banks of Sabine lake, caused fear that the town was about to be visited by a tidal wave. There was a rush for the depot, and the evening local train to Beaumont was soon filled with excited women and children. An hour after the storm, however, the water had all drained off, and today the streets are dry.

### Robbed and Beaten.

In Justice Shenandoah's court last evening Victor Zogalski was sentenced to the penitentiary for highway robbery and assault and battery preferred against Joseph Guianus, Victor Vesuvaki and Joseph Adamowicz. The deeds were committed on the 29th of August last as Zogalski was returning at a late hour at night to his home at the extreme end of East Lloyd street. He says as he reached the Reading railroad tracks he was attacked from the rear and beaten. Furthermore he states that his pockets were rifled, but could not state whether he was robbed of any money. Guianus was held in \$500 bail while the other two perpetrators were held in \$500 bail. Another of the rascals, Peter Paszewicz, appeared at the session, Justice this morning and delivered himself up. He furnished \$500 bail for his appearance at court.
