

CREDITORS

They Produce Witnesses to Contradici Tabor and Szydlowski,

A FORMER EMPLOYE TESTIFIES

He Tells About the Receipt and Sale of Smoked Goods in Considerable Quantity. Szydlowski is Contradicted in Several Respects Concerning His Credit Statements.
