MAY PROSECUTE.
Inquest May Result in Trouble For a Midwife.
An inquest was held last night on the death of Mrs. Franz Hensy and her new born child. The deceased resided on West Centre street, near the Brownville line. The woman was about 35 years of age. At about 8 a. m. on Wednesday last she gave birth to a child, which lived only a short time. The mother died at about 7 a. m. the same day. At the inquest it became known that a Lithuanian midwife had attended the deceased. The jury concluded that the woman had probably died from hemorrhage, but no conclusion could be reached as to the death of the child. The midwife, it is alleged, is practicing without a license and may be prosecuted on that score.

MAHANOY CITY.
Car From a Breaker Crashes Into a Train.
MAHANOY CITY, Oct. 22.—What narrowly escaped being a serious accident happened at the P. & R. switch near Stecker's shops yesterday afternoon. Engine No. 870 was coming down the grade from the North Mahanoy colliery with a long trip of loaded coal cars when it was struck by a loaded coal car run from the Mahanoy City colliery siding. The car runner says the break failed to work. Engineer Mucklow, of Mahanoy Plane, who was in charge of the engine, applied the breaks and reversed his engine, but was unable to stop his train in time and he jumped just before the runaway car struck his engine a few feet from the cab. The covering was ripped from the boiler, a large steam connection was torn off and the tank was demolished.
