ATKINSON DENOUNCES LYNCHERS Georgia's Governor Would Arm Pris-

oners to Prevent Their Murder. Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 28.—Mob law was severely condemned by Governor Atkinson in his message to the Georgia legislature, which convened here yesterday. The message bristled with a scorehing and sensational attack upon the lawless spirit that fosters the lynch law in this state.

He says that to exterminate the practice of lynching, the crime must be

made odious and shameful.
