G. H. PULLMAN'S WILL

The Bulk of His Estate Goes to His Two Married Daughters.

HIS SONS ALMOST DISINHERITED.

They Are to Receive Only an Annual Income of \$3,000—Mrs. Pullman is Richly Provided For—To Establish a Training School at Pullman.

Chicago, Oct. 28.—The will of the late George M. Pullman was filed in probate court yesterday. Norman B. Ream and Robert T. Lincoln are named as executors. The bulk of the estate goes to the two daughters, Mrs. Frank O. Lowden, of Chicago, and Mrs. Frank Carolan, of San Francisco, who receive \$1,000,000 each and also the residuary estate, the amount of which is now unknown except to the executors. The homestead at the corner of Prairie avenue and Eighteenth street, the construction of which cost \$300,000, the furniture, pictures, etc., is devised to his wife for life, and she is also to receive \$50,000 for the first year, and thereafter during her life the income of \$125,000.

"Castle Rest," on one of the Thousand Islands, is given to his daughter Florence (Mrs. Lowden), with the furniture, for life. She is requested to keep "Castle Rest" open from July 26 to Aug. 14 for the accommodation of the descendants of the testator's parents, and is authorized to designate in her will who shall have the property after her death. A sum of \$100,000 is left in trust for its maintenance.

The sum of \$2,000,000 is left in trust for the daughters until they are 35 years old, when each is to receive \$500,000, and thereafter absolutely the other \$1,000,000 to be still held in trust, the income going to them. If either daughter leave issue the sum held in trust is to become absolutely the property of such issue.

In case of the death of either daughter, leaving no issue, but leaving a husband, one-half of the property then held in trust for such daughter is to be absolutely the property of such husband, the other half becoming a part of the residuary estate.

The eighth provision of the will declares: "Inasmuch as neither of my sons has developed such a sense of responsibility as in my judgment is requisite for the wise use of large properties and considerable sums of money, I am painfully compelled, as I have explicitly stated to them, to limit my testamentary provisions for their benefit to trusts producing only such income as I deem reasonable for their support."

Provision is then made which gives them each an annual income of \$3,000, and should they die and leave legal issue the income is to go to such issue. Otherwise it reverts to the estate.

Two brothers, Royal Henry Pullman and John M. Pullman, and the sisters, Helen Pullman West and Emma Pullman Fluhrer, are bequeathed \$50,000 apiece. The sisters are given equal shares in the furniture, pictures, etc., in the Belgravia apartment house in the city of New York. The wife of his brother, Charles L. Pullman, is given the income of \$25,000, and is to go to her son, William Pullman, upon her death.

Other bequests are: Florence Sanger, \$20,000; Stuart West, \$5,000; Bertha West, \$5,000; Helen Fluhrer, \$5,000; Lewis Pullman Fluhrer, \$5,000; Mrs. Charles B. Smith, \$5,000; Mrs. Charles H. Eaton, \$10,000; William A. Angell, \$10,000; Silas W. Bretzfeld, of New York, \$10,000; Charles S. Sweet, \$10,000; Miss Maria Louise Orr, \$5,000.

The following amounts are left to "charitable employes": Arthur Wells, \$5,000; William Wells, \$5,000; William R. Johnson, \$2,000. The household servants are to get \$250 to \$500 apiece. Thirteen Chicago charitable institutions are to receive \$100,000 each.

The testator states it was his purpose to found, erect and endow at Pullman, Ill., during his life, a free school of manual training for the benefit of the children of persons living and employed at Pullman, and to expend at least \$200,000 for lands, buildings and apparatus, and to provide a fund of \$1,000,000 for the maintenance, management and endowment of the school. His executors are directed to set aside \$1,200,000 for this purpose.

If the estate shall be more than sufficient to satisfy all the debts, trusts and legacies the testator is directed to give the excess into two equal shares for the two daughters, who are to receive all the property which becomes a part of the residuary estate.

The total value of the estate is shown by the petition for letters testamentary to be \$7,600,000. Of this amount \$6,800,000 is personal property and \$800,000 realty. Attorney Runnels, who prepared the will, said that these figures are a conservative, but fair estimate of the value of the estate.

THE SPANISH REPLY.

It Is Not Gaining Alarm among the Government Officials.

NOT AN OFFENSIVE DOCUMENT.

Our Government Will Let the Matter Rest Until Congress Meets, Giving Sagasta's Government Ample Time to Perfect Its Plans in Cuba.

Washington, Oct. 28.—The event of yesterday at the state department was the receipt of the long expected cablegram from United States Minister Woodford, at Madrid, transmitting the answer of the Spanish government to his representations in the interest of peace in Cuba. There were a little less than a thousand words in the message, for Mr. Woodford, instead of calling the whole of the Spanish answer to his note, had contented himself with sending the matter to a brief outline.

The first copy was taken at once to the president, not being entrusted to a messenger, but being delivered by Chief Clerk Michaels in person at the White House. After due opportunity had been allowed the president to read the message an application was made for a statement of its contents or nature. This was declined by Secretary Porter, and it was said that under no circumstances would the correspondence be made public before consideration by the cabinet.

From unofficial information that has reached administration officials in Woodford's as to the nature of the Spanish reply it is evident that in neither language nor subject matter is the communication likely to be taken as offensive by our government. It may be, it is true, regarded as insufficient to meet the issue presented by Mr. Woodford in his note, but officials of the state department say that, in view of what has already been accomplished by the new Spanish cabinet in reforming abuses in Cuba, in removing Weyler and in projecting what appears to be a liberal measure of autonomy, our government will certainly rest, at least until congress assembles, and afford the new Spanish government reasonable time to carry out its plans.

Vice Consul General Springer, at Havana, has telegraphed the state department that the Spanish authorities have pardoned Frank Agraromonte and Tomas Julio Sams. Two American citizens who have been imprisoned at Santiago de Cuba since June, 1895, there are now probably less than half a dozen Americans held prisoners in Cuba, exclusive of the Competitor crew.

St. Louis, Oct. 28.—Yesterday afternoon fire started on one of the upper floors of the four story building at Seventh and Chestnut streets, occupied by the Washburn railway general offices. There were eight deaths and 18 new cases yesterday.
