English capitalists have been inspecting sites in Reading for the erection of a woolen mill.

Huntmen report that wild turkeys and pheasants are fairly numerous in Centre county.

The estate of the late Samuel Heffner will be offered at public sale, to pay the debts of the same.

The funeral of the late James O'Hara, Sr., took place yesterday from his late home at New Philadelphia.

Dr. D. W. Richards has been reinstated as a member of the Medical Pension Examining Board at Easton.

There are now 762 Indians in the government school at Carlisle, and they spoke originally 68 different languages.

The Woman's Relief Corps of the Seventh Pennsylvania district held its fourth annual convention at Sunbury yesterday.

With very interesting ceremonies, Rev. H. C. Loop was installed as president of the Lebanon Valley College at Annville.

The boy recently found murdered in a stock car at Williamsport, is now believed to have been Fred Gilbert, formerly of Reading.

Sharpeners in Cumberland county are getting numerous farmers to sign what seem to be contracts to sell all their wheat at \$1 a bushel, though the documents are really promissory notes.

The Carpenter Steel Works, of Reading, which are working over-time on Uncle Sam's projectiles, has also just sent a final order of 40,000 bolts to India for railroad construction work.

Although an indictment for alleged embezzlement on the part of I. G. Miller, tax collector of Cumru, Berks county, was quashed for its defects, a new bill is to be presented, and the administrator of Samuel Shepp, one of Miller's bondsmen, has been used for over \$2000.

The Lehigh Valley Coal Company has increased the wages of its stripping employees in and around Hazleton from 90c to \$1.10 per day.

More arrests of Berks county dairymen for the use of a "cream ripener" in their butter to increase its weight ten per cent, are promulgated by state officials.

A Centre constable, Edward Hall, writes back from Juman that he is one of hundreds of Klondikers who have turned back, disheartened at the difficulties in reaching the gold fields.

Wilson M. Gearhart, a clerk in the State Department at Harrisburg, has been appointed on the Board of Trustees of the Lehigh Valley College at Annville, vice William D. Himmelschlag, deceased.

A mammoth breaker will be erected near Mt. Carmel by the Midvalley Coal Company.

The changes on the Lehigh Valley railroad booked to take place November 1st will be quite numerous. It is said the powers of South Branch are to be increased.
